

## OUTSIDE NEWS FROM WIRE AND CABLE

Port McNicholl, Ont.—Canadian Pacific lake steamer Assiniboia, 250 passengers and crew aboard, went ashore off Cove Island. Pulled off without damage or injury.

Vienna.—Abdication of Prince William of Wied from Albanian throne expected hourly. Mussulman tribesmen still menace capital.

Cincinnati.—Judson Harmon and Rufus B. Smith of Cincinnati appointed receivers for C., H. & D. R. R., following application by Bankers' Trust Co. of New York.

Lagrange, Ore.—One robber killed when four men attempted to rob passengers on train near Kamela. Three bandits fled to mountains. Deputy Sheriff McDuffee, passenger on train, slightly wounded.

Washington.—Favorable report on nomination of Adolph C. Miller of San Francisco to serve ten years on federal reserve board ordered by Senate banking committee.

Washington.—Consul Miller at Tampico, Admiral Mayo and Capt. Sterling on way to Panuco oil fields to investigate reports of outbreaks against American and British citizens in that district.

Washington.—Brig. Gen. R. T. Evans declared newspapers misquoted him, in replying to request from war department that he explain reported criticism of administration's foreign policy.

Philadelphia.—Thomas Lowry, former butler in fashionable families, arrested for obtaining \$65,000 from fellow servants which he said he invested in get-rich-quick securities. Lowry said he was fleeced by bucket shops.

Kansas City, Mo.—Twenty-first annual convention Baptist Young People's Union of America, held jointly with Baptist Young People's Union of South, began today.

Memphis, Tenn.—Five cents authorized for every dead rat delivered to mayor.

Detroit, Mich.—Body of unidentified man with legs bound together taken from river. Believed to have been murdered and robbed.

Burlington, Ia.—Clifford Johnson killed. Thrown from auto.

Paris.—Suffrage ambitions are bringing brain fog and physical deterioration to women of France, according to Dr. Louis Brocq; blames suffrage for decline in French birth-rate.

Mobile, Ala.—Frank Williams, wrecked in health, released from state prison after serving twenty years of fifty-year sentence for stealing 50 cents.

Paris.—Two largest airships in world practically completed. Will be used by army. Equipped with bomb-throwing tubes, quick-firing guns and wireless.

Washington.—Portuguese senate voted \$100,000 for exhibit at Panama Exposition at San Francisco.

New York.—Gang of Italians, headed by Antonio Siragosa, arrested. Police believe them guilty of kidnappings, bomb throwings and blackmail.

Shanesville, O.—Private bank operated here for 30 years by John Doershik closed today by state bank examiner.

Madison, Wis.—Bomb wrecked Calro Trena's barber shop.

Panama.—American troops likely to be asked here to prevent expected rioting during election of Panama national assembly.

Indianapolis.—Serious charges against Dr. W. A. Winters, Newcastle, Ind., dentist, his wife and W. R. Cooper, roomer, growing out of mysterious disappearance of Catherine Winters, 9, will not be pressed.

Pittsburgh.—Albert Stofiel tripped while running for car. Bit off end of tongue. Arrested as drunk because he couldn't talk.
