

## CALLS DETECTIVE BURNS A "BULLY AND A BRUTE"

New York, July 18.—Preparing for a complete rest of several weeks at Lumberville, N. J., Mrs. Florence Carman, indicted on a manslaughter charge in connection with the mysterious killing of Mrs. Louise Bailey in her husband's office, today denounced Detective William J. Burns as a "bully and a brute."

She declared the tramp who swore he saw her run from the window through which sped the bullet that killed Mrs. Bailey was "one of Burns' creatures."

At liberty on \$20,000 bail, Mrs. Carman planned to leave here tonight or tomorrow morning for Philadelphia, with her husband, Dr. Edwin Carman, and her little daughter, Elizabeth.

From there the party will go to Atlantic City and thence to Delaware Water Gap. After a few days at the Gap they will retire to the Carman farm a few miles distant.

"It is unbelievable," said Mrs. Carman, "that the grand jury indicted me on the testimony of a negro woman, who has twice changed her stories, and a tramp who did not appear in the case until Burns came into it."

"Burns was sent to my house by Dis't Att'y Smith as my friend. The first thing he said, as he stuck his jaw out and leered into my face, was, 'I have come to get somebody, and that somebody is you.'"

The first work of Att'y Levy for the defense, he announced today, will be an effort to have the indictment dismissed.

## FORD HAS SOME OUTPUT

Detroit, Mich., July 18.—The Ford Motor Co., between October 1, 1913, and July 1, 1914, built and sold 203,184 cars, an average of 22,500 cars per month for nine months. This enormous product placed in a line a half mile apart would encircle the

globe four times at the equator and the output would carry the entire population of Detroit and Baltimore on a picnic run around the world. The combined horsepower of the cars is more than two thirds of all the developed water power of the United States.

## CHICAGO BEACH HOTEL WANTS TO GRAB OFF PART OF LAKE

The Chicago Beach Hotel, which wishes to operate that part of the lake that bounds the hotel as a commercial proposition, fought for this privilege yesterday at a conference with Ass't Corporation Counsel Skinner, who is representing the city.

The city recently ordered the tearing down of a fence which the hotel had built to keep the "undesirables" out. Hence John Hately and Edwin A. Potter, representing the hotel, are peeved.

The Chicago Beach Hotel, however, is quite willing to let the "undesirables" in—if they pay so much a head.

"They may talk about the 'city beautiful' plan all they care to," said Ass't Corporation Counsel Skinner, "but what they want is a chance to make money. They plan to charge rates of from 10 to 50 cents. There were 900 on the beach yesterday and most of them would have been there even if they had to pay."
