WOMEN SAY NEWSPAPER ADS LURE GIRLS TO CHICAGO—NO JOBS

Ads in newspapers throughout the country that lure young girls to Chicago under the impression that this is the "land of promise" will be carefully investigated by the Travelers' Aid Department of the Chicago Y. W. C. A.

Therefore, the Travelers' Aid have completed details of a plan to send warnings broadcast that there never was a time before when jobs for girls were as much in demand in Chicago as right now.

The organization is authority for the statement that the traffic in white slaves is being renewed after a lull of a couple of years.

According to Secretary Wilhelmina Barr, there will be six classes of girls in the warning. They are:

- 1—Girls afflicted with "travelitis."
- 2—Employed girls who come in answer to the false lure of better wages.
- 3—Immigrants.
- 4—Girls coming to visit relatives or friends whom they have not seen for some time.
- 5—Show girls.
- 6—Runaways.

The letter of warning is as follows: "Girls are coming to Chicago every day from all over the world seeking employment. We have been in Travelers' Aid work for over twenty-five years and there never has been a time like this in all the history of our work when it has been so impossible for strange girls to obtain work.

"The people of Chicago refuse to employ girls without recommendations and girls with fine educations are taking almost any kind of work now to make an honest living. We

earnestly ask you to warn women, men and girls not to come here.

"So many girls who have come from some part of Europe stay in New York long enough to get money to come to Chicago, where they seek work long enough to enable them to go on to some other part of the world. When I ask them why they did not stay where they were until they had money enough to take care of themselves or were sure of employment, they answer, 'We want to see America.'

"We want to do all we can, but I think it is about time we are giving some attention to the girls we have on hand. So, unless girls make sure they have employment after reaching here, or have corresponded with friends to be sure of a home, they should not come to Chicago.

"Many come to Chicago expecting to stay with friends. Some of them they have not heard from for years, and, consequently, when they reach here they find that their friends have moved to another part of the country.

"Girls come here from New York City, Detroit, Cleveland and every other city in the country thinking they will receive larger salaries. This is a great mistake, and I earnestly ask the newspapers and societies which have the interest of girls at heart to do all they can to correct these errors."
