POLICE ACCUSED BY HULL HOUSE OF STARTING WEST SIDE RIOT

**Social Workers Crowd Courtroom Ready to Stand by
Unemployed — Jane Addams Investigates and
Hurls Charges at Police—Ed Nockels Blames
Schuettler's Craze for Publicity**

Hull House social workers and residents of South Halsted street crowded the Desplaines street courtroom today ready and eager to testify that the riot that followed the parade of the unemployed of Chicago yesterday was started by the police, working under orders from First Deputy Herman Schuettler, and not the unemployed.

Jane Addams, after having completed a careful investigation of the affair, appeared in court and announced that Hull House would stand

by the jobless men and women who were dragged to jail by Serg't Make Mills and his crew.

Sophonisba Breckenridge and Miss Addams said they would show that the police started the riot by the reckless use of their revolvers and that previous to that the men and women marchers had been orderly.

Edward P. Nockels, secretary of the Chicago Federation of Labor, blamed Herman Schuettler and his mania for publicity for the entire affair.
