Washington. — Coast guard service ordered every cutter south of Boston to Diamond Shoals, N. C., to aid eight vessels wrecked off that point on coast.

Pasadena, Cal.—Carl Busch, member of famous family of St. Louis brewers, died after long illness.

New York.—Captain and six of the crew of schooner Lizzie B. Willey brought into port by steamer which rescued them south of Cape Hatteras, April 6; without food four days when rescued.

HOTEL DE GINK CLOSES—HOME FARM FOR HOBOES OPENED

New York, April 8.—The Hotel de Gink, Gotham's famous hobo hostelry, closed its doors today. Its foyer, spacious lobby, card and checker room, grill and kitchen were stripped of furnishings.

Guests and outfittings were transplanted to a Bensonhurst farm, and a new summer home for wayfarers, called the Hotel de Gump, opened. "Gump" means "chicken" in the vernacular of the road, according to Jeff Davis, presiding genius of the project. The "bos" will raise chickens this summer, use of the farm having been donated.

Davis said today the De Gink was put out of business by New York's "charity trust," but would be opened in a new location next winter.

The hotel guests and their baggage were moved in style today from the old hotel to their summer residence, two automobiles and an automobile truck being donated.

THE MEXICAN SITUATION

Washington, April 8. — Route by Gen. Obregon of Gen. Villa's army near Celaya, Mexico, was claimed today by Caranzista agency here.

Washington, April 8. — Another snarl was added to the already badly tangled Mexican situation today by news that Victoriano Huerta was en route from Spain to New York, presumably with plans in mind for re-establishing his regime south of the Rio Grande.
