GIRL TO EXPOSE "TIP TRUST"

The inside workings of the tip trust, who control checkrooms of nearly all Chicago's big hotels and restaurants, is to be exposed by a former employe.

Mary Hudwagner, seven years an employe of the trust, recently bought their concession on the checkroom of the Cafe du Lac. When the stand began to pay she was ousted, according to her charges.

Today a \$10,000 suit against Frank Oliver, proprietor of the restaurant; Otto Krahenbull, his manager, and Policeman Flanagan will be filed.

"The tip trust controls every checkroom in Chicago which pays excepting the Blackstone, Congress, Auditorium and a few more hotels," said Miss Hudwagner. "The girls do not get the money, it is taken by the hotel."

She says Bernard Neuberger, Jacques Rouso and Al Weisberg compose the "trust" which takes \$100,000 a year from the pockets of Chicagoans.
