#### MORE ARRESTS IN DOPE WAR

#### STREET CAR MEN PRESENT NEW SCALE TO BOSSES

Thirty-three cents as the pay for beginners and an increase to 36 cents an hour in the second year of service will be among the demands of the street railway employees' union to be tendered the car companies today. Ten hours' work a day to be spent during a consecutive twelve is the other demand of the unions.

The ten-hour day is asked in a bill now before the legislature, but the success of the law is doubtful.

The arbitration committees of the unions and employers will first meet and confer. If the demands of the employes are refused a strike vote will be taken.

Syracuse, N. Y.—Col. Roosevelt's testimony in the Barnes libel suit was dealt a vital blow when Judge Andrews ruled out all of that portion of the colonel's testimony which related to printing graft charges.

Washington.—Navy League of the U. S. passed resolution urging immediate session of congress to provide for materially strengthening the navy immediately at an expenditure of \$500,000,000.
