**WILSON ABOUT READY WITH
NEW GERMAN NOTE**

Washington, June 3.—The president, secluded in the White House, has about completed rough draft of new German note. It still remains to be passed upon by Robert Lansing, state department counselor and expert on international law. After that it will be subject only to such changes as last minute consultations with the cabinet suggest.

Ambassador von Bernstorff has promised to try to make the kaiser's government see that the U. S. cannot back down. He has agreed to let his home government know that it has underestimated the depth of feeling in America over Germany's apparent unwillingness to respect what Americans consider their rights.

**BLANKET INDICTMENT FOR
SHAVERS AND HARVEY**

The May grand jury, by a plurality of one vote, last night returned a blanket indictment against Dr. Eva Shaver, 1120 Sedgwick st., her son Clarence and W. C. Harvey for the murder of Anna Johnson, who was found dead in the physician's home from a bullet wound. A post-mortem disclosed an illegal operation had been performed on the girl. The indictment charges murder and abortion.

The vote of the grand jury was 12 to 11.

TO DISCUSS REINBERG VERDICT

At a meeting of the county board today the verdict of a coroner's jury which held an inquest over the body of Katie Reinberg will be discussed.

Mrs. Reinberg was struck by a street car. County hospital authorities thinking she was intoxicated, turned her away. She subsequently died at the Bridewell hospital from a skull fracture. The jury recommended the establishment of an observation ward in the County hospital.

Coroner Hoffman sent Mayor Thompson and Peter Reinberg copies of the verdict.
