SOME INSIDE DOPE ON ST. RY. MANAGEMENT

*Supt. Weatherwax Airs His Views on How to Handle
Men—Wants 'Em to Work Longer and Keep Out
of Mischief—Bill Gets \$10,000 a Year.*

Supt. Bill Weatherwax has some original ideas about how to make street railway employees efficient.

He aired some of his views before the arbitration board this morning; and one of them was that the 10-hour average was too low and that the men ought to work an average of 11 hours.

Bill offered himself as Exhibit A of how a man can rise from the ranks in the service of the street railway, for Bill used to get a few cents an hour and now pulls down \$10,000 a year.

Then Jake LeBosky, lawyer for the union, made a comparison of Weatherwax and Roland Shelton. Both were doing the same work back in 1893, and Shelton is a man of more education than Weatherwax; but now Shelton, after all these years of service, is getting 32 cents an hour and Weatherwax \$10,000 a year.

Maclay Hoyne asked a few questions and drew from Weatherwax the fact that receivers on the North Side lines get \$100 a month for the same work receivers on the South Side lines are paid \$90, though some of
