GRAIN "CALL RULE" OUSTED

The "call rule" of the Board of Trade, which sets prices on grain futures, was abolished yesterday by an order of Judge Landis in the federal court. With the call rule goes the call committee, which has been setting grain prices for the middle west.

According to Dis't Att'y Chas. Clyne, who prosecuted the suit, the call committee through its power of ratifying contracts made in the Board of Trade has controlled the disposal of the entire Mississippi valley grain crop.
