Mrs. Thomas Bundy of San Francisco, mother of one, is woman tennis champion of the Pacific coast and picked to be national champion when she meets Miss Mollie Bjurstedt, Norwegian, who won the title while Mrs. Bundy was in temporary retirement.

Mrs. Bundy was formerly Miss May Sutton and won the national title several times. Her husband and Maurice McLoughlin held the men's double championship.

The career of Mrs. Almert is unusual. She never had a shotgun in her hands until the latter part of May. In less than two months she was champion.

In the Grand American handicap meet, when she helped the Chicago Diana club win the woman's team championship, she broke 25 straight birds, then 21 of the next 25. Later in a private club shoot she broke 25 straight, then 23 of the next 25.

In the past six weeks she has twice beaten L. B. Clarke, Grand American champion. She has won two club trophies and a cup offered by the Sportsmen's club.

Mrs. Almert says she took up trapshooting to find an outdoor sport she could enjoy with her husband and children. Mr. and Mrs. Almert shot at a club where there is a sand pile in which their children play while a target event is being held.

"Since I took up shooting I have lost interest in teas and cards," says this unusual champion. "I believe that if housework is systematically arranged mothers can find time for outdoor games."

OLD-TIME HOG KILLING IN THE WOMEN'S TRADE UNION LEAGUE

The Women's Trade Union league are going to have 50 pigs fattened for a hog killing on the day of their bazaar, Dec. 4, according to a plan of Mrs. Leonore Z. Meder, chairman of the bazaar committee.

"It is customary to have hog killing in the south around that time," said Mrs. Meder at a meeting held in the La Salle hotel yesterday. "and I think it would be a good plan to have fifty banks representing pigs placed in public places to be fattened. The Adult Probation Officers have agreed to fatten one, Mrs. Cooley of the Women's City club has agreed that one may be placed there, Mrs. Boland of the Political Equality league will take another, and Mrs. L. Brackett Bishop will place one at the Chicago Beach hotel. We can place the others."

In addition to the pig fattening to get finances for the Women's Trade Union league, dollar contributions are to be solicited by various members of the bazaar committee. Mrs. Meder pledged herself to raise \$50 in this manner.

It is planned to make the bazaar, which will be held in the Masonic Temple, the biggest event of its kind ever held under the auspices of the league. A turkey lunch and dinner will be served.
