RECOMMEND REVOCATION OF DANCE HALL LICENSES

Revocation of licenses of five dance halls was recommended to city council last night in report of morals commission. Halls are: Central, 2159 Wabash av.; Palace, 443 N. Clark; East End, 645 N. Clark; Mozart, 1502 Clybourn; Best, 2170 Clybourn.

Supervision of dances in Schoenhofen's hall, 1224 Milwaukee av., and of Bellevue Benevolent ass'n and Barney's dances in Wicker Park hall, 2040 North av., was recommended.

"Schoenhofen's hall seems to be a center for girls who pick up men on the street," says report. "On night of Nov. 6 twenty-four autos were standing in front of hall at midnight. As girls came out they were addressed by men who stood beside cars. In nearly every instance the girls entered the cars and drove off with the men."

Improper conditions were also reported in these halls: Novak's, 1959 Grand av.; Prof. Roach's, 673 W. Madison; John Rogers, 1401 W. 15th; Mazzoni's, 846 S. Jefferson.

WINNETKA POSTMASTER GOES BACK TO POSITION
