## SLAIN POLICEMAN BURIED— MURDER HUNT GOES ON

Bror Johnson, policeman slain Friday afternoon by the robber who held up the Thos. Cook Tourist Agency, was buried today. The mayor, a picked squad of police and a host of friends attended the funeral services of the hero traffic officer at his home, 2327 W. Walton st. Rev. J. S. Finn, pastor of St. Mark's Roman Catholic church, who married Johnson, conducted the services. Burial was made in St. Joseph's cemetery.

While the murdered policeman was being buried the hunt for his slayer went on. Eyes of the police are now centered upon J. J. McGovern, friend of the first suspect, Wm. LaTrasse, and Hazel Bushel, both of Kansas City. McGovern is being held in Kansas City.

## APPOINTED A PARK COPPER WHILE INDICTED

Elmer W. Ervine, who was given job and star as patrolman by the south park board while he was under grand jury indictment on a grand larceny charge, had his case continued before Judge Fitch today.

Ervine and Henry Gregory were caught by Serg't A. E. Jenner, Nov., 1914, as they staggered away from the wrecked auto of E. H. Munster, carrying a load of blankets, tires, lamps, robes and other auto accessories. They did not give the grand jury a satisfactory explanation and were indicted.

Last October, notwithstanding the indictment against him, Ervine was made a patrolman by the south park board and was detailed to Washington park. L. B. Patterson, chairman of the board, admits that an investigation is supposed to be made of into the moral character of candidates for the park police force.
