The Will of J. C. Selwin Probated.

By the terms of the will of the late John C. Selwin, Mr. Richard Waverly and Mr. Charles Annin were left \$100,000 and \$50,000 respectively.

Mr. Waverly is appointed president and manager of the Selwin Book Concern and Mr. Annin retains his place as secretary-treasurer.

Both these gentlemen are made executors of the will, which distributed \$1,500,000 between charities, old employes and the widow of the testator.

Mrs. Richard Waverly Meets With Serious Accident.

Yesterday as Mrs. Richard Waverly was leaving St. Luke's hospital, where she had been calling on an ill friend, she fell and broke her leg. She was taken to the operating room and an X-ray photograph disclosed an oblique fracture of both bones. She was immediately given an anaesthetic, the bones set and the limb placed in a cast. Today she is reported as resting as well as possible.

The accident is particularly deplorable as Mrs. Waverly was about to accompany Mrs. Selwin, whose husband was buried last Monday, on a trip south.

Mrs. Richard Waverly Undergoes Another Operation.

The many friends of Mrs. Richard Waverly will be grieved to know that she has had to undergo another operation on her leg. The X-ray showed that the bones had slipped, necessitating a resetting of them. She did not recover from the anesthesia as quickly as from the last, and at one time pneumonia was feared. She is better today and unless the bones slip again she will be able to see her many

friends at the hospital next week.

Mrs. Richard Waverly Has Third Operation.

This morning Mrs. Richard Waverly was operated on the third time since she broke her legs two weeks ago. This time an incision was made and the bone was made to hold in place by a silver plate. This operation is necessary very frequently in cases of oblique fractures. The surgeons in charge now are sure that Mrs. Waverly will have no more trouble.

WOMEN PROTEST EXCLUSION BY LA SALLE HOTEL

The Illinois State Court of the Guardians of Liberty in a letter signed by Wm. F. Bigelow, state guardian, have protested to E. J. Stevens, manager of the Hotel La Salle, because the Woman's Party of Cook Co. has been excluded from that hotel, saying "the generally accepted belief is that you took this action under pressure from certain outside influences."

Resolutions were adopted by "the Woman's Party of Cook Co.," Charlotte C. Rhodes, president; by the Alliance of Protestant Women of Illinois" and the "American Public School Federation" protesting against this action of the La Salle management, charging that it was taken after the management had booked the Woman's Party of Cook Co. until June, 1916.

The general charge is made that the Roman Catholic influence is responsible for barring the Woman's Party from the hotel after it had been holding its meetings there for five years.

The letter and the various resolutions are being circulated in circular form.
