NEW MEXICO MILITIA GOES OVER SOUTHERN BORDER

Columbus, N. M., June 29. — Reports that large Carranzista forces were concentrating at Guzman in a position to cut the American communication lines resulted in several motor truck loads of New Mexico militia being sent into Mexico to bring back cavalry horses approaching Guzman under small guard. This is first time militia men have crossed border into Mexico.

JOSLYN ASKS ORPET HOW HE KNEW MARION WAS DEAD

Waukegan, Ill., June 29.—Prosecutor Joslyn threatened several times to destroy altogether the calm of Will Orpet during the third day of cross examination today. When driven to a corner Orpet fell back on "I don't remember" as his answer.

"How did you know she was dead?" demanded Joslyn. "Did you know she was dead when you left her in the woods or did you wait for the newspapers to see what happened to her?"

"I knew she was dead when I left her. I judged from her appearance?"

"You knew because you knew cyanide acted that way?"

"No, I didn't know it was cyanide," replied Orpet.

Earlier in the day Joslyn drew from Orpet the admission that he had registered at the University of Wisconsin as from Sauk City, Wis. Orpet said he did that to avoid paying \$135 year non-resident tuition fee.

During the morning Joslyn shot many questions at Orpet regarding the "fog" or "cloud" that descended on his brain when he left Marion dead in Helm's woods.

"How thick were those clouds?" asked Joslyn.

"I don't know."

"What did you think when the fog lifted?"

"I knew I had not done right and I wished I had not done as I had."

"Did the fog lift long enough for you to throw away a bottle as your train passed Lake Winona?"

"I threw away only one bottle, the bottle I threw away in the woods after I left Marion," Orpet said, dodging the trap.

Orpet appeared greatly refreshed and confident when he took the stand in the morning. His attorneys had told him this would probably be the last day of Joslyn's cross-examination.
