GREECE ACCEPTS CONDITIONS— TURNS FLEET TO ALLIES

Paris.—Greece has accepted all the conditions imposed by allies, including disarmament of all forts, internment of Greek fleet and use of railways and canals by allies.

London.—New Greek provisional government headed by ex-Premier Venizelos and favoring Greece's entrance into war, began taking shape at about same hour French naval authorities took over ships of Greek navy.

Gen. Zimkrakakis, warm supporter of allied cause, was sworn in as war minister.

Greek ships were taken over early yesterday afternoon under direction of Admiral D'Artige du Fournet, commanding Anglo-French fleet.

Petrograd.—Poisoned sweets and garlic infected with cholera bacilli, were dropped by enemy flyers who attacked Rumanian Black Sea port of Constanza.

London.—British cavalry brigade cleared country around Seres of Bulgarian troops, but found city of Seres itself strongly occupied by Bulgars.

Berlin.—Six strong allied attacks on front between Morval and Bauchavesnes, north of the Somme, continued until early this morning, completely repulsed.
