Winnipeg, Manitoba.—There will be no strike of Canadian trainmen today, D. C. Coleman, assistant to General Manager Grant Hall of the Canadian Pacific, said.

Washington.—Question of wages and hours of labor will be first thing taken up by joint sub-committee of congress when it meets Nov. 20 to take up inquiry into railroad situation.

Washington. — Mexican embassy officially branded as "pure invention" reports Gen. Carranza is preparing to withdraw as leader of de facto government in Mexico and perhaps leave the country.

Buenos Aires.—Severe drouth that threatens severe damage to Argentine wheat crop has boosted wheat prices and killed all chances United States may obtain relief from rising flour prices from Argentine shipments.

Maré Island Navy Yard, Cal.—Keel of superdreadnaught California, the largest warship ever put under construction on Pacific coast, laid here.

hold-ups became numerous. Now they'll burn all night.


