THREE CONFERENCE GAMES TODAY—MICH. VS. SYRACUSE

Private banks, like a certain ball team hereabouts, attribute their failure to reckless running. And poor management is also blamed—for the troubles of the banks.

Today should go far toward clarifying the football situation, both in the east and west. Three Conference games are scheduled and no one of them is a certainty for any team. Chicago vs. Wisconsin, Purdue vs. Illinois and Minnesota vs. Iowa all should be vigorously contested, and, while Wisconsin, Illinois and Minnesota should be victors, they have no gelid gallop over the opposition.

Coach Stagg of the Maroons is promising a surprise. And a victory for the Midwayites would be considerable upset, not so much because of any strength the Badgers have exhibited so far, but because of the weakness and uncertainty of the Maroons in every angle of the game.

Illinois goes in crippled, but should have enough reserve strength left to drive over the Bollermakers. Minnesota looms as the most formidable team in the Conference, though Iowa is better than for several years.

Indiana meets Tufts, an eleven that has whipped Harvard, and there is little hope for a Hoosier victory. A defeat will not be a setback for western football, as the Hoosiers were defeated by Chicago, which in turn lost two games. Michigan lines up against Syracuse and the winner will give its section of the country a boost. Both elevens are representative of the best in their respective neighborhoods.

In the east all eyes are focussed on the Cornell-Harvard scrap, with the
