

## ALLIES VICTORIOUS ON FIVE DIFFERENT FRONTS

London.—Allied victories on five different fronts today were cited as another evidence of new policy of utmost co-operation and co-ordination of effort among the nations of entente.

British, French, Serbian and Russian troops each won distinct victories in every field of fighting. Most spectacular of the victories reported was Russia's smashing of two miles of German front, along Rumanian Carpathian line. They likewise decisively broke down attempted German offensive on Riga front.

On the western front there were three successful raids—two by British forces, near Neuville St. Vaast and Le Transloys and one by the French around Verdun.

From Macedonia came word today that Gen. Serrail's combination of French-British and Serbian forces had struck out once more, advancing toward Prilep.

Berlin.—On west bank of the Meuse there was lively fighting activity. French tried to advance by surprise without fire preparation against positions on Height 304, which Germans captured Jan. 25. From noon on strong artillery worked upon Teuton trenches. After violent fire three more French attacks ensued, all of which broke down without success.

PETROGRAD.—Capture of 30 officers and more than 1,000 German soldiers announced in Russian victory northeast of Jakobeni.

Berlin, via Sayville Wireless.—Great activity of British raiding parties and details of assault in three waves of British troops north of Armentieres reported. All attempts against German lines repulsed.

Berlin, via Tuckerton Wireless.—Armed transport vessel, "crammed with troops," sank ten minutes after attack by a German submarine on January 25, said official announcement. Transport, convoyed by

French cruiser, was sunk 250 miles east of Malta, by submarine which sank three vessels in two weeks' operations in Mediterranean.
