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## ARMED PARTICIPATION IN WAR IS HINTED BY PRESIDENT WILSON

**Declares United States Is Not Self-Seeking in Foreign  
Policy—Says We Have Been Wronged on Seas—  
Calls For United Front by All America—  
Sworn In for Second Term.**

Washington, March 5.—President Wilson sounded a new doctrine of internationalism and world peace in his inaugural address today, but in the same breath warned that the United States may require "a more immediate association" with the war than mere armed neutrality.

He spoke a unity of American thought, spirit and daction and voiced the view that this must be an Americanism steeped in world-spirit—in-

stead of the isolated national view of the past.

His principal plea for world peace, spoken before the thousands attending his second inauguration, called for:

- Limitation of world armaments.
- Equal interest and responsibility of all nations for maintaining peace.
- Equality of nations in all matters of right or privilege.
- Destruction of the "armed balance of power."
