THE UTAH COUNCILS' AIMS.

We publish today the majority and minority reports of the Utah Commission, dated September 1st, 1891. Gen. McClelland alone dissent from the majority report. He sets forth his views of the chief questions involved in his own style and independent manner. No slight or ostentatious contrast.

The majority of the Commission pursues the course on which they have entered in the beginning and assume that its functions are much greater and more varied than are warranted by the law which gave it existence. Reference to the fifth section of the Edmonds act will show what are its legal powers. They are simply to appoint proper persons to fill the legislative and executive offices here occupied by officers elected by the people, and to give certificates of election to persons duly elected by the Utah Legislature.

The various reports of this body exhibit the impression that it was specifically charged with the duty of instituting a political machine which is in the minority, of putting down the majority, and of suppressing polygamy in Utah. The present report forms an exception to this rule.

The hostile manner in which the Commission speaks of the planing two "Liberals" against one of the People's party on the boards of election judges, thus giving non-factors of the voting population double the representation accorded to the other three-fourths, has occasioned over the numerous of the "Liberals" faction in Ogden, Salt Lake and Provo, and the spreading on the report of the whole "Liberals" platform and resolutions, are positive evidences of this. No wonder that liberal people have described the Commission as an "agent of the 'Liberals' faction."

The chief purpose of the present majority report is to impress the government with the truth that the "Mormons" people are not sincere in their resolution to cease contracting further plural marriages, and to divide an national party lines. This is the position assumed by the "Liberals" ring-leaders, and their charges are thus adopted and given official vouch. The report in this respect is but an echo of well-known "Liberals" perversion.

The recent charges that "the Mormon Church has lately in the past dictated the political movements of its adherents." This is nothing more nor less than a "Liberals" falsehood without any basis for its support. The only attempt at proof of the statement is given further on in the report, and is simply the publication of correspondence between an apostate and the Bishop of the ward where he resided, and a note of the action of the High Council of the Stake in his case. From this it appears that the man joined an anti-"Mormons" league and his Bishop did not think this compatible with his standing as a "Mormon." His communication does not appear to us as being a result from that one fact. But supposing it did, the action of a minister for uniting with an antagonistic body was not an act that any church or association would be justified in taking. It is not the slightest particle of proof that "the Mormon Church has invariably dictated the political movements of its adherents." The production of this correspondence as the only thing the Commission could offer in evidence affords striking proof that the assertion which it was designed to support is utterly without foundation.

The report states that the "Mormons" Church has "lately used the Commission through all the years it has been administering the law against polygamy." In this instance the Commission cunningly refrains from offering anything to substantiate its assertion. The Church never said anything against the Commission until the October Conference of 1890, when it voted to sustain the manifesto. In that there was no denunciation of the Commission, but only a declaration of the statement in which the Commission gave publicity, that forty-one male persons had recently contracted polygamous marriages.

This utterly groundless assertion is repeated in the present report and the equally false statement is made that during the past year, eighteen male persons with the same number of female persons have entered into polygamous marriages. If it is demonstrable to deny these baseless rumors, the "Mormons" Church has denounced the Commission on two occasions, namely at the October Conference of 1890 and 1891. On no other occasion has the Church taken issue with the Commission.

The Deseret News has consistently and honestly published the minority report of the Commission, and has also defined it when it acted impudently and was assailed by the "Liberals" who now seem to own the greater part of it. But we challenge the Commission if any of its members be permitted one thing we have said about it that was not true.

Since when was the Commission changed with the administration of the law against polygamy? There is nothing of this in the law. We have explained the power as defined by statute. I

WEEKLY TRADE REPORT.

From a. C. W. in their trade report for the week ending October 3, 1891, state that though some trouble appeared in the stock market, yet the business of the country went on as usual. Cattle are large and are now fat. Horses are receiving excellent prices, which show that the year since from the entire cost of farms. This property will give an impetus to manufacturers, and the result will be that general trade will become active.

A most encouraging feature of the present favorable situation is the fact that it is marked by an appreciable ease of settlement, hence the danger of a financial reaction is reduced to a minimum. The iron and steel trades are lively; tin, copper and lead fair, but satisfactory trade. The sales of wool were there were 5,500,000 pounds, with first prices, Philadelphia, reports generally improved, but substantial new. At Chicago, some increase is seen in receipts of corn, oats and clover, an eighth in cattle, a third in wool, and wheat receipts are five times that of last year's.

In spite of several circulars advising farmers to hold their wheat, the price declined about one cent. Atlantic exports for four days were 300,000 bushels, against 17,511 for the same week last year. Cattle advanced two cents and one cent and muttons first during the week. Imports of sheep declined, though smaller than last year's, are still quite large. The exports from New York were about the same as during the corresponding period last year.

Business failures for the week mentioned were in the United States 201, and in Canada 29. For the corresponding week of last year the figures were 150 in the United States and 21 in Canada.

THE TERRITORIAL FAIRS.

Are Their Legitimate Rights Retarded by Misdoings?

I wish to present through your columns a few thoughts in reference to the Territorial Fair, which closed yesterday. In looking around for expressions of opinion as to the quality of the exhibition, it seems to be the general view that, taken as a whole, it was in some extent behind that of 1890. The stock men first were perhaps an exception in this regard, being particularly low. Such is I believe, the popular estimate of the exhibition.

It is my opinion that, in times of equal prosperity, no Utah Territorial Fair should be behind any of its predecessors. More than that, each successive exhibition should, on the contrary, be ahead of all those that go before. If this be not the case there is something wrong. There must either be a diminution of interest on the part of those who ought to be exhibitors, or a stagnation of material development.

The latter is certainly the reason, because the Territory is making rapid material progress. This knowledge points to the cause for the meagre progress made by our Territorial Fair, as far as its quality is concerned. It is because the leading objects of the Deseret Agricultural and Manufacturing Society are becoming antiquated in more and more respects.

Anything like a solid and permanent attention from the legitimate exhibitors must have that effect. That the masses of the people who have their attention diverted, almost to absorption, by this show-bus business, is a fact too patent to be disputed.

It may be urged on the other hand that these spectacles are necessary to induce the people to pay their way. I contend, however, that if display is a detriment to the interests of the Territory, as the Deseret Agricultural and Manufacturing Society, it is more better to devote means to a more profitable way to make a deficit in meeting the expense that might occur, even if it should have to be supplied by taxation.
