Jessie Deanna of Caldwell, Idaho, has commenced suit against Eugene V. McLaughlin for \$25,000 on account of a promise. McLaughlin and Miss Deanna were engaged to be married, but on May 10 he was married to Irene Gray.

John Brady, an Oakland, Cal., real-estate man, convicted of selling liquor without a license was hanged on Friday. 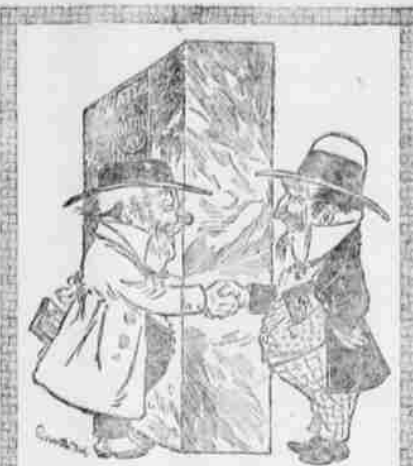

Eventually he rose to be foreman, with a salary of \$5,000 a year. Then came the great financial strike, which brought ruin and death to so many men. Boone was involved with the other gamblers who prevailed. When the strike was over Boone was a ruined man. His place was lost, and a reputation established as a man who could not be relied on. He was a gambler, and he was a gambler in California. He came to Los Angeles some months ago, expecting to obtain a position as foreman of the cutting mill.
