OGDEN CITY COUNCIL.

Long and Busy Session of the City Fathers.

The City Council met in regular session this evening and transacted considerable business.

The Mayor presented a communication in which he returned the report of the finance committee recommending the engagement of a deputy recorder at \$500 per month, and allowing the recorder to receive for his services the same as for the three months of his term.

He did not believe in the payment of any extras and did not wish the office of deputy recorder to be created but admitted that a competent assistant was needed in the office and he felt that the three could do all the work in the office, without any additional compensation. The vote was unanimously sustained.

The committee on claims recommended the payment of miscellaneous claims amounting to \$139.85, \$12 item for notarial work having been struck out on the suggestion of the recorder, who thought it was not necessary to pass the bill for him in view of the fact that the Mayor had allowed \$100 per said sum had been sustained. The amount was allowed less the item passed.

The same committee also recommended that E. H. Anderson be allowed \$250 as full payment of his back salary, and that the full amount asked for by Mrs. H. S. Emerson, \$350, be paid. This was carried.

The special committee who had been appointed to report on the matter of securing a post house for the city reported recommending that the city pay \$100,000, the present lessee of the property, the sum of \$500 for the release of his lease of the premises, the building and a reasonable amount of ground. Referred to the committee of the whole.

The special committee to report on the petition necessary to fit up a committee of the public buildings and grounds reported recommending that the city be authorized to spend as much as \$25,000 as may be necessary for furnishing the room. Referred to the committee of the whole.

The boardkeeper reported three head of horses, all of which had been returned to the city treasury. Accepted.

The chief of police asked that his annual report be printed. Referred to the committee on engineering.

S. H. Fox and others asked that the city establish public weigh scales. Referred to the committee on public buildings and grounds.

G. H. Malan desired to buy the waste water.






