MEETING OF BUSINESS MEN.

Organize Utah Credit Men's Association Last Night.

RETAIL DEALERS NOT IN IT. A Social Organization to Promote the Interests of Utah Merchants and Protect Them Against Fraud.

Thirty of Salt Lake's representative business men met at the Knutsford last evening and organized the Utah Credit Men's association, electing the following officers and directors: E. W. Duncan, of the National Bank of the Republic, president; F. W. Gunnel, Cosgriff-Enright Grocery company, vice president; Emanuel Kahn, treasurer; George D. Anson, Hanson Produce Company, secretary, and George T. Odell, Arthur Parsons, P. L. Doran, J. W. Delano and J. G. McDonald, directors.

The subject of organization was opened with a general discussion which closed with the conclusion on the part of those present, to confine the local credit men's association to those houses which made a specialty of wholesale trade and banks that employed credit men, therefore retail houses cannot join the merchants' mutual protective association.

It was decided that the association would not consist of an incorporated body, but would partake more of the nature of a social organization, where members could meet together and interchange ideas on anything relating to their business.

It was also decided at the meeting that a caucus be held on the morning of the day of the State convention in order to decide upon the personnel of several committees.

RULERS OF THE WORLD.
