It is stated that the Republican convention to nominate delegates to the national convention to be held at Philadelphia will meet in this city on May 10th.

It is reported that the Hon. Thomas Fitch, who so eloquently advocated the principles of Republicanism in this city last week, and who now resides in California, has concluded to again make this city his home.

Carpenters union No. 134 met last night and speeches were made by Chairman O. E. Graham, Thomas Morris of the Stonecarvers' Union; E. N. Haze, J. H. Britton and J. Hanger, all of whom spoke on the benefits of organization.

City Auditor A. S. Reiser, who has been seriously ill for several days, is feeling considerably improved today, and expects soon to be at his post again, where he can feel better satisfied in conducting his duties than in directing them from a sick room.

The Utah Society Army of the Philippines will hold its annual meeting at the Grand Pacific hotel tomorrow evening. All soldiers who saw service in the Philippines are earnestly requested to attend. Forwards are being made to make the artillery ball at Christensen's, April 16th, a memorable event.

Sanpete Democrat: Sheep shearing will commence at the Rio Grande Western corral west of Manti about the 10th of this month. The weather at present, however, is rather unfavorable, and a start may not be made as soon as intended. About the usual number of sheep will be sheared.

The mystic realms of Eldorado were unfolded to the entranced gaze of Mr. F. H. Lanning, Lindsay Rogers, F. H. Peters and Ed. Moss last evening. They had been ushered into the inner circles the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Joe Emswiler, ex-officio; Rev. HORSE BREEDERS IN SESSION.

Interesting Meeting Being Held in the Moran Block.

President H. W. Brown Outlines Method for Improving Utah Horses.

The Utah Horse Breeders' association is in session this afternoon in the Moran block, on Second South street. The members have under discussion the best methods to employ in elevating the breed of the horse in Utah and to enlarge the membership of the association that an enthusiastic spirit may be diffused throughout the State among horse breeders. There is no more opportune time than the present to awaken such interest among horsemen as the good horse has not been in such great demand for years, despite the facts on the passing of the horse which is in common parlance, and the use of steam and electricity and the prospective use of liquid air that threatens to be more potent than either for certain purposes. President H. W. Brown of the association, who is presiding over the meeting, was seen this afternoon and in respect to the object and aims of the society, stated that he could not tell what was to be accomplished, but he was going to suggest to the breeders as the most practical means of improving the breed, in his opinion, is the discontinuance entirely of cross breeding and making every new generation better than the preceding one.

JAMES H. BACON IN BANKRUPTCY.

Well Known Ex-Banker Petitions for Relief by Law.

LIABILITIES ARE \$528,426.24

His Assets Which are All Claimed to be Exempt Amount to \$5,209.50—Over Thousand Creditors.

James H. Bacon, the well known ex-banker of this city, today filed a petition in bankruptcy in the United States court. The paper is a most voluminous one, containing a list of over one thousand creditors. His liabilities are represented to be \$528,426.24, and of that sum there are \$129,462.73 secured and \$398,963.51 unsecured claims. His assets, all of which are claimed to be exempt, are set forth at \$5,209.50.

Moore, 2,205.40; C. W. Olson, 2,712.50; Henry Rippe & Brother, 2,906.48; J. L. May, treasurer, 13,402.48; W. J. Gilbert, 1,456.00; P. Lambour, 2,205.40; J. W. Judd, 12,167.50; Harriet W. Selis, 2,694.85.

Creditors whose claims are unsecured are in part: L. M. Bacon, \$10,096.57; M. M. Jarvis, New York, 3,500.00; Emily R. Marr, 2,673.60; S. A. Tunnell, Newcom, Ill., 1,100.00; W. S. Bailey, Newcom, Ill., 29,058.33; S. B. H. H. H., 28,250.00; Ogden City, 150,000.00.

Nearly all these debts were contracted by the petitioner individually and while he was conducting a general banking business in this city. His assets consist of \$169.50 cash on hand, household goods amounting to \$190.00, and an insurance policy for \$5,000. These assets are claimed to be exempt.

A San Francisco Chronicle dispatch from St. Louis, under date of April 2nd, says:

"Victory Bateman, according to her statement to an actress friend, was abandoned last week by her young husband, Harry Mestayer. She added that Mestayer took all her money except \$125, and all her jewels, and that he left her to join a vaudeville actress. If he has left her for Sarah Bernhardt, she said bitterly, 'it would not have been quite as bad, but it hurts me to think that he left me for a 25 year old woman.'"

Miss Bateman and Mestayer were married about two months. In an interview a month ago she said she was the happiest woman on earth and Mestayer confessed to a similar state of mind and heart. It is rumored that Miss Bateman, after her abandonment, tried to commit suicide at the Hotel Garni, but neither she nor the hotel agent will say anything about it.
