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TO VOTE ON PHILIPPINES.

This Action Will Soon be Taken on the Spooner Bill.

OPPOSITION IS NOT STRONG. Proposed Bill Simply Gives President Power to Govern Temporarily—Foraker a Good Fighter.

Special Correspondence. Washington, April 4.—The belief is general among senators that debate upon the insular possessions is nearly exhausted. It is the intention of Senator Lodge, chairman of the committee on Philippines, to press the Spooner bill to an early vote, and owing to the fact that so much has been already said on the Philippines it is thought that a vote ought not to be long delayed. There are now a dozen resolutions "on the table" which have been debated at great length. They were introduced for the purpose of debate and have been pretty generally discussed. Then Puerto Rico has been but a text for the discussion of insular affairs. The Spooner bill simply gives the President power to govern the Philippines until further action by Congress, not very much opposition will be developed to it, although the Democrats will offer amendments, declaring the intention of the United States to grant independence to the islands as soon as peace can be restored. There will be considerable talk on this line, but for the most part the long, set speeches have been made, and the debate will be general. For this reason the belief is expressed that there will not be much further discussion on the Philippines in the Senate.

Called Him Pugnacious. "That fellow is so pugnacious," remarked Senator Stewart of Nevada during the Puerto Rican debate, "that I think I shall jump into him myself." He was referring to Senator Foraker, who has charge of the Puerto Rican legislation in the Senate. Senator Foraker stood ready at all times to defend his bill and explain its provisions. An easy talker, quick and active, he never loses a criticism of the measure or any of its provisions, or any reference to what he has said or advocated that he is not on his feet to reply. This has caused him a great deal of effort, as he has been obliged to explain over and over again many of the provisions of the bill simply because he will not allow any apparent misstatement of him, or of his report or of his position in regard to it to go unchallenged. While this keeps his record straight, it is not always the best method of getting through legislation. There are too many senators who like running debate such as Foraker gives, and at him from the time he starts until he closes. Senator Foraker exhibited the same determination during the Republican conference that were held over town here a few days before his Republican colleagues as he did in the Senate. There are other senators, who, in charge of a measure and their position is attacked or when the legislation is introduced, make an explanation when actually driven to it. Such men are Senators Allison and Hale, who for many years have been very successful in getting appropriation bills through.

The Northwest in Evidence. While senators representing States from various parts of the country say that they are not interested in legislation for Alaska, it is evident who are really interested when the bill actually comes up. Aside from Senator Bate of Tennessee, who has insisted that all the land for Alaska be reserved, and who has hindered rather than assisted the passage of the bill, it will be noticed that the senators from the States of California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Nevada, Montana and North Dakota are those who are on hand when the bill has before the Senate for amendment and passage. The senators most interested and who give it constant attention are Carter, Shoup, Perkins, Hanabrough, Foster, McBridge and Simon. The bill is in the charge of Senator Carter, who has a great deal of experience in territorial affairs and is also well up in mining matters.

Concerning Coins. If the treasury officials were allowed to exercise their own judgment in regard to the coins of the United States, they would make it a remodeling of designs now in use. Under the law the designs on coins can be changed but once in 20 years. A few years ago a change was made, when the present style was inaugurated. Since its adoption there has been much dissatisfaction expressed. The department is very unfavorably impressed with the reverse side of the quarter and has stated that if Congress would grant it permission it would insure a dainty and appropriate design for the reverse of this coin. The reverse of the current quarter is decidedly lacking in symmetry and balance. There is too much to it, and its component parts are run together in a way to present a shabby appearance. The matter of nickels has also been given some little attention. In many instances nickels have been passed for quarters, and the reverse has occurred at less frequent intervals. It has been suggested that some other metal substituted for the 5 cent piece, or that its size may be altered to fit with this confusion. Another suggestion is that a coin of the value of half a cent be coined, especially for use in the island possessions, but this is looked upon with disfavor, as is the proposition to dispense with the 1 cent piece altogether. The half dollar and one dollar coins of silver seem to be perfectly satisfactory in design.

BILL NO. 25 FOR AN ORDINANCE Creating the office of Inspector of provisions for Salt Lake City, Utah, and defining the duties of said Inspector. Be it enacted by the City Council of Salt Lake City, Utah, that the office of Inspector of Provisions for Salt Lake City, Utah, is hereby created.

Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Provisions to obey all orders of the Health Commissioner and the Board of Health. He shall perform the duties usually and ordinarily required of such an official, including the inspection of dairies, slaughter houses, and all places of business contemplated by the ordinance of Salt Lake City, Utah, now in force, and make the proper tests to determine the purity of milk and other food products held for sale in Salt Lake City, Utah.
