A FATAL EXPLOSION.


John W. Sullivan is Killed by a Premature Blast.

A communication from Hawksville, Utah, conveys the news that John W. Sullivan has succumbed to injuries sustained while working at the Hoosier mine in the Henry Mountains.

Col. Baden-Powell reported officially from Mafeking, under date of April 29, that all was well there. He adds: "Thirteen native women tried to get away during the night of April 15. The enemy opened fire on them and killed 9, and wounded two. I wrote the natives, pointing out that the shells for the native staff, which is full of women and children, and that when they were trying to escape, the Boers fogged them and sent them back, and at night they shot them down, pretending to mistake them for night attacks. Snymman has not replied. The proportion of those killed and wounded above speaks for itself."

Other news from Mafeking details the careful watching of the provisions and says there are diminished rations for nine thousand souls within the beleaguered town.

AMERICANS IN DESPERATE FIGHT

It appears that a reconnoitering party of the Twenty-fourth infantry was surrounded and that six of the Americans were killed and that sixteen others severely wounded were left on the field. The remainder had a narrow escape.
