100 VOLUMES OF THE STANDARD DICTIONARY

PEACE AT LAST.

The Rescue Home Secures a House in Eastern Section of City.

The Rescue Home, after being tossed about on a turbulent sea for many months, has at last been safely and securely harbored. Through the benevolence of one man, who wishes his name to be repressed, a home has at last been found for the unfortunate girls, whom the society wishes to benefit. The house, which is an eight-room brick, is located near First South and Eighth East. The unknown benefactor, purchased the house and will rent it to the society for a mere nominal sum. Rev. Richard Wake has been chosen trustee of the property and Mrs. Sarah Reid is the matron. The inmates of the home are busied in the care of a household and are trained in other things that will qualify them to support themselves in the world without resorting to sin.

The home is open to those unfortunate young women who have been victimized by men or forced into sin through the pressure of want, and who manifest a sincere desire to return to the path of virtue. Mrs. J. C. Weeter is the president of the Rescue Home association, and the members of the advisory board are Mrs. A. J. Graham, treasurer; Mrs. Plummer, Mrs. Annie Adams and Rev. Richard Wake.

SUCCESSFUL APPLICANTS.

State Board of Pharmacy Issues Five Certificates.

The State board of pharmacy has concluded its sessions, and as a result the following nine applicants for license to practice pharmacy have received certificates: First class or registered pharmacists, F. P. Sherwood and O. T. Clough, Salt Lake. Second class or assistant pharmacists, Ernest Amstutz, Carl Sandberg, C. Jackson, all of Salt Lake.

The board has received complaints from various portions of the State to the effect that men are carrying on the drug business who have not been properly registered, and moreover are employing incompetent help. Secretary McCoy says that he is going to visit several points in the State to investigate the matter. He goes to Ogden tomorrow.

SUCCUMBS TO INJURIES.

W. H. Coshell Was Fatally Hurt in Falling from a Scaffold.

William H. Coshell, succumbed yesterday to the injuries sustained in a fall from a scaffold on Tuesday. Mr. Coshell lived on Fourteenth South and Third East streets, and was building a chimney on a house near his home, when the scaffold broke and Coshell fell heavily to the ground, a distance of sixteen feet. His leg was broken just above the knee, and the protruding bone stuck in the ground. He also sustained serious injuries of an internal nature. He was attended by Dr. Ferree, of Murray, but medical skill could not arrest the approach of death. Mr. Coshell was 41 years old, and leaves a wife and six children, the youngest of whom is but one week old. He was a highly respected man in the community and was in comfortable circumstances. The funeral will be held Sunday, at noon, from the 319th street meeting house under the auspices of the Women of the World, Murray camp, of which he was a valuable member.

A MILLION DOLLAR SMELTER.

Vice President Sewell of the American Smelting and Refining Company Says That One Will be Built in Salt Lake Valley.

Agreeable to the statement made by Vice President Barton Sewell of the American Smelting and Refining company on the day of his arrival that he would have some news to give out in a few days, he has now announced that within thirty days the ground will be broken in this valley for a million dollar smelter. Mr. Sewell could not be seen yesterday afternoon, but when seen last evening he was prepared to talk on the matter. The plant is to have a capacity of something like 30,000 tons per month, which may be doubled on short notice. The site has not yet been chosen, but it will be within fifteen miles of the city. Various locations are now being examined and one of them will be decided upon during the next few days. The company will aim to have the new smelter in operation by the end of the year. As soon as this is accomplished the old plants at present being operated by the company will be classed among the "have-beens."
