PAYS TO WORK PRISONERS

The Expenses of Meals and Medicine is Greatly Curtailed.

DURING THE MONTH PRIOR TO WORKING

3351 Meals Were Served, While Last Month There Were 1,110 Less.

As an indication of the benefits of the chain gang, there are now on an average about ten men on the boulevard each week, whereas at the time the present system was adopted there were about twenty-three men in the gang.

The month prior to the working of the prisoners there were served at the city jail 3,251 meals, at 7 1/2 cents per meal. During the following month the prisoners worked, there were served just 1,100 meals less, and the number is gradually decreasing. Besides cutting down the expenses to a great extent, Salt Lake is rid of a large number of hobos and tough characters. The medicine bill, too, is cut in half, so that together with less meal expenses, and medicine bills and the good work done by the prisoners on the boulevard, the chain gang system is a decided success.

PLUCKY STAND.

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TROUBLE IN THE CANYON.

D. B. Brinton Runs Against a Special Patrol Officer.

There was an exciting row and threatened gun play in Parley's canyon this morning, in which Patrolman Phineas Young and Bishop D. B. Brinton of Big Cottonwood figured as principals.

It all happened on account of Brinton and three of his men attempting to drive 45 head of cattle through the canyon. They were met by Young, who ordered them to turn back.

Brinton and his men refused to comply with the orders and bad words followed. Finally Brinton made an attack upon the patrolman and struck him on the head with a club. Then Young reached for his gun and said, "If you attempt to strike me again, I will shoot you."

Although the odds were four to one, Young finally succeeded in turning them back, but only after a hard struggle, during which a calf fell into the reservoir and had to be fished out. Brinton and his men started for town to secure a warrant for Young's arrest, and Young put off to do the same for his enemies. Before starting, however, he telephoned to town of the trouble, and Sergeant Ed Janney went up the canyon to prevent the animals from going up further. The trouble occurred near the conduit.

ARREST POLICEMAN YOUNG.

Took a Herd of Cattle in Charge in Parley's Canyon.

Acting under a city ordinance, Special Policeman Phineas H. Young, who for some time past has been patrolling Parley's canyon under the direction of Land and Water Commissioner Westfield, this morning took in charge a herd of cattle belonging to D. B. Brinton and Bishop P. Stilling, claiming that the animals were befouling the streams.

Messrs. Brinton and Stillman at once sought the county commissioners and laid the matter before them. The board referred the case to the county attorney with power to act. Mr. Van Cott at once ordered Young arrested. The question, therefore, of the city's authority to make an arrest in Parley's canyon for alleged befouling of waters will now be tested in the courts.

Young is charged with obstructing a public highway.
