WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The area of low pressure is central this morning over the northern Rocky Mountain slope. The crest of the area of high pressure lies along the Washington and Oregon coast while a second "high" covers the upper Lake region. It is cooler over eastern Washington, northern Idaho, western Montana and northern Utah. The distribution of atmospheric pressure this morning indicates that the hot wave will be broken in this vicinity by tonight. Rain has fallen along the Washington and Oregon coast, over northern Montana, eastern South Dakota and along the Texas coast. LOCAL BRIEFS.

Only a few copies of the "News" anniversary edition are now remaining and at the present rate of demand they will all be exhausted at the end of next week. John Radford, conductor of a construction car of the Salt Lake City Railroad Company, is at the Holy Cross hospital, suffering from a flesh wound and a contusion of the right foot, which he sustained in an accident yesterday. A seven-year-old son of John C. Cutler fell from a poplar tree 22 feet to the ground about six o'clock last night. Drs. Richards and Bowers say they do not think anything serious will result, but it was a very close call. He had a restless night, but seems better today. Orson Thompson, of Murray, was overcome by the heat at Salt Lake yesterday. He drove in to Salt Lake and boarded the 10:15 train for the lake. He said that he was feeling badly at the time. ANDREW BRIKEN STRICKEN DOWN.

Popular Young Business Man Succumbs to an Operation.

WAS A SELF-RELIANT MAN.

His Malady Had Reached a Very Aggravated Stage Before Operation Was Performed. The death of Andrew C. Brixen, which occurred last evening, is news which will create profound grief in many hearts in Salt Lake City and wherever the deceased was known. For the past fifteen days his life has been hanging by a thread, and while those who understood the situation expected to see the cord severed at any moment, it did not rob the catastrophe of the painful shock, and genuine grief that is now being felt. Ten or twelve days ago Mr. Brixen was seized with such a severe pain that he had to take to his bed. Last Sunday the pain lessened, and he thought that he would not be attacked again, but in the evening it returned with added severity, and he lapsed into a delirious state, out of which he passed but once before his death. Dr. Beer was summoned, and he at once advised an operation. The sick man seemed to dread it, however, and would not give his consent until his suffering became so intense that he decided in the hope of obtaining relief. Drs. Pinkerton and Richards were called in and after a consultation all agreed that to operate was the only reasonable course to pursue, and on Thursday evening an operation was performed under the hands of Dr. Beer.
