LOCAL BRIEFS.

Col. Jay L. Torrey is remembering the lads of his Rough Rider regiment by sending each a neat souvenir badge on which is an appropriate inscription and a picture of the colonel mounted on his favorite horse, Volunteer. George Matteson, a mechanic of Ogden, filed a petition in bankruptcy today, in the amount of \$1,306.47. His assets are \$75, and he claims to be exempted. The creditors are four persons of New York State. The funeral of Miss Clarice Orem will be held on Sunday, July 8, at 3 p. m. from the residence of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Orem, No. 67 east First South street. The funeral will be held at Mt. Olivet. Friends are respectfully invited. A sacred concert will be given in the Salt Palace theater, beginning at 8:30 o'clock tomorrow evening. The management announces that the program, so far as band music goes, will be entirely classical in its character, and that every artist in the troupe will appear in some appropriate number during the evening. Harold W. Christensen, aged 1 year and 8 months, son of Carl E. Christensen, died yesterday of meningitis. The mother of the child died in February last, making it a double affliction for Mr. Christensen. The twin brother of Harold, the only child remaining, is being received with particular efforts for his pleasure. The horses in Maj. Edmund Wilkes' first contract for supplying cavalry regiments at Fort Douglas yesterday by Dr. Walter Frost. There were eighty-three horses in all and they are said to be an exceptionally fine lot. In order to fulfill the second contract, Maj. Wilkes and Dr. Frost have been here last night to look at a number of horses there. The horses that were acceptable were shipped to Salt Lake today and examined at the post. Civil service examinations will be held in this city on August 14, for the positions of transportation clerks, quartermaster's department at large, for assistants in the division of entomology, department of agriculture and for Chinese interpreters. Also on August 14 and 15 will be held examinations for positions of inspectors of boilers in the steamboat inspection service. Persons desiring to take any of these examinations should apply to the United States civil service commission, Washington, D. C., for application forms. Rev. Dr. Clarence T. Brown, of the First Congregational church, will leave next Tuesday morning for a six weeks vacation in California where his family now is. Rev. Richard T. Brown, who formerly visited this city with Mr. Moody, will occupy the pulpit of the First Congregational church on the remaining Sundays here, Edward McMillan, of Adrian, Mich., will officiate. A serious fire was narrowly averted yesterday at the home of Geo. B. Whitcomb, Reed street, near the Warm Springs. It seems that in the absence of the housekeeper, Mr. Whitcomb's helpless children were playing with matches in or near the clothes closet and started a conflagration among the clothes which was in a fair way of reducing the house to ashes, but for the alertness and presence of mind of Mrs. Whitcomb and Mrs. Holmes living in adjoining houses. Through their efforts the fire was extinguished before much damage was done beyond burning some of the clothes which the closet contained.

SPECIAL MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL

Geo. Pugsley's Communication is Sent Back to Him,

ON A STRICT PARTY VOTE.

New Ordinance Passed—Stream from Lake in Liberty Park in Filthy Condition.

The City Council met in special session last night. The roll called showed the following members to be present: Beatty, Canning, Ferguson, Hartenstein, Hewitt, Howe (Edgar), Howe (C. R.), Reid, Robertson, Tuddenham and Buckle.

Mayor Thompson's veto of the Beatty resolution, providing for additional help for the health commissioner, was read, and, upon motion of Robertson, was laid over for one week.

A communication from George Pugsley, whom Chief Devine a few weeks ago appointed a member of the fire department, but who was objected to by the Republican members on account of his politics, was read and ordered filed.

Later the motion to file was reconsidered and the communication was referred back to the writer without any reference being made to it in the minutes.

The substance of Mr. Pugsley's letter was that he withdrew his candidacy for the reason that he believed he could not be confirmed without sacrificing his principles; that it was not competent for certain members of the Council to do so; and that the city had two mayors, a mayor in fact and a mayor in name.

Robertson and Thomas characterized the communication as an insult to every member of the Council. The latter said that Pugsley's name had never been considered by the Republican caucus, for the reason that he had sent in his resignation before the caucus convened.

Ferguson opposed the motion to refer the communication back. Mr. Pugsley was a citizen and as such had a perfect right to express his views. Of course, the Council could do with the letter as it saw fit, but he did not think it showed much dignity or respect for the views of others to treat it in the manner proposed.

The motion to return the letter prevailed upon a strict party vote.

NEW ORDINANCE PASSED. Thomas introduced an ordinance providing for the appropriation of \$1,000 to the Utah Central Railroad company when it shall have removed its tracks from Eighth South, Ninth South and the west bank of the Jordan canal. The measure passed.

Chief Devine sent in a communication inviting members to visit the new fire station on I street. Referred to fire committee.

Canning offered a resolution recommending that the new bond issue be made in denominations of not less than \$50 and \$100.

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STREAM IN BAD CONDITION.

People residing in the vicinity of Liberty Park complained of the unsanitary conditions prevailing in their neighborhood, caused, they said, by obstructions and stagnant water in the stream from the lake in the park. Upon motion of Thomas the health department was instructed to clean up the stream.

Buckle offered a resolution calling upon the Salt Lake City Railroad company to remove bowlders and debris on the line between Third and Fourth streets. It was stated that the nuisance had existed for about a year and Street Supervisor Condie was instructed to compel its abatement even if he had to resort to the taking of legal proceedings.
