

GREAT ACTIVITY AT THE BOQUE FORTS

Events at Canton That Presage a Big War.

ALLIES ARE NEARING PEKIN

Report That They Have Advanced 35 Miles—Nothing Definite About This.

London, Aug. 4.—All is quiet at Canton but there is great activity at the Boque forts, which are fully manned, and on the walls of which flags are hoisted. Constant practice is had with the big guns at enfilade targets.

HAVE ADVANCED 35 MILES.

London, Aug. 4.—According to a special dispatch from Shanghai, dated August 2d, the advancing columns of the allies had reported there yesterday to have reached a point thirty miles beyond Tien Tsin. Nothing from any other point corroborates this statement. In fact the Standard goes so far as to say that it fears the real advance, apart from preliminary operations, has not yet begun.

The Tsin dispatches dated July 30th tell of an event which is termed a "reconnaissance between the Japanese and Chinese," two miles beyond the Hsika arsenal, in which the Japanese withdrew after suffering thirty casualties.

MOSTLY AGAINST FOREIGNERS.

Li Hsue Chang has been informed from Peking that Prince China's only prominent supporters in his peace policy are Gen. Yuan Lu and Wang Wen shan, president of the board of revenue, whose influence is small.

It is said that a resident of Weston, Calif., has received a telegram from a nephew in Peking, dated August 2d, saying: "Safe in the British legation."

Republican Campaign Speakers.

New York, Aug. 3.—Chairman Hanna, of the National Republican committee, was informed today by Senator Scott of the speaker's bureau, that during the campaign in Maine the following speakers would be heard there: Postmaster General Chas. Emory Smith at Skowhegan, Sept. 5; Senator Fairbanks at Bangor, Sept. 25; Rockland, Sept. 27; and Portland, Sept. 29.

King Humbert's Remains.

London, Aug. 3.—The remains of King Humbert were today placed in a casket covered with lead and glass and a banner as to leave the face exposed. The ceremony, which took place in the presence of the royal family, was very touching.

ARRIVED FROM ALASKA.

Steamer Queen With 250 Passengers—Body Found—Late News.

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 4.—The steamer Queen arrived tonight from Alaska with 250 passengers, including Boundary Commissioner W. F. King, the British commissioner, and O. B. French, the American commissioner. They have concluded their work on White, Chilkot and Chilkat mountains.

Secret Service Work.

Washington, Aug. 2.—The thirty-fifth annual report of the secret service division submitted to Secretary Gage by Chief Wilkie today shows 654 arrests during the year, with 215 convictions. Fifty convictions resulting from the arrests and four fugitives from justice. The largest number of arrests, 31, were made in New York, followed by New York with 11 and Texas with 46. Of the 654 arrests, 154 were made in the United States, 20 in Italy, 20 in Germany, 12 in Ireland, while the remainder reported all parts of Europe.

The reported money captured and value of which \$12,000 was returned to the treasury, the captured plants for the manufacture of counterfeit notes numbered 20,000, silver dimes and 300 pieces of counterfeit gold and silver, coins were secured.

On new counterfeit notes made their appearance during the year, though they were not considered dangerous and were arrested, Chase and Porto de Rio, which were visited by agents of the secret service.

It is stated that the repeated arrests and convictions do not seem to be a complete deterrent to criminals who make counterfeiting their business. Chief Wilkie recommends an amendment to the revenue laws which shall provide for the imprisonment for five years to the sentence for the first conviction, and for life imprisonment for a third conviction.

Bryan Writes His Speech.

London, N. Y., Aug. 3.—Mr. Bryan today concluded the writing of his speech to be made at Indianapolis next week in accepting the Democratic nomination for the presidency. He spent the entire day in this work, which is about 3,000 words in length. He has adhered to his original plan of devoting the document almost entirely to the question of insurrection. In following this course he has the general plan adopted in his campaign speech to the subject maintained by the Democratic platform. For this reason the policy of



TRAVELERS' BURDEN LIFTED.

Agents Will Now See That They are Properly Prepared for Their Journeys Over the Ocean.

Persons coming from the interior on their way to a trip at sea will now be provided for by agents whose business will be to see that they are properly located on board their steamships. At the pier, if they come over the New York Central Lines, they are met by a uniformed person who takes entire charge of them. He sees that their baggage is checked, that they designate the trunks which are to go into the hold and the ones for their staterooms. These agents also see that the passengers arriving from Europe, the baggage of the passengers is transferred to the New York Central Lines. They are advised about hotels, are advised on the subject of cab hire. Their transportation, their sleeping car berths and all matters of that kind are carefully arranged for them.

WAR IN SOUTH AFRICA.

News Indecisive, but Indicates an Early Peace. New York, Aug. 4.—A dispatch to the Tribune from London says: War news from South Africa remains indecisive, with the general trend in the

direction of a speedy close of hostilities. The military situation in the Transvaal is still incomplete, but it will approach four thousand, without doubt. Lord Kitchener is in charge of the operations against Gen. Dewet's command and the Boer diversion at Pretoria had been easily checked.

The seriousness of the investment of Gen. Baden-Powell at Rustenburg is shown by the rapid march of Gen. Buller's column for his relief, although Lord Methuen had previously been reported as having undertaken the same mission.

The story of the war is now so badly told in press dispatches that its political sequel excites more interest than the campaign itself. The Boer war has been the subject of discussion in parliament yesterday. One was the spirited reply by the marquis of Lansdowne to Lord Rosebery's charge that Lord Chamberlain had not stood up as an expert to declare that he approved of the plans of the war office, and the other was the reference by Mr. Chamberlain to the Boer war by two members of parliament yesterday. The secret correspondence captured at Bloemfontein. There have been many rumors about the correspondence, and it was expected that they would be lively seen when Mr. Chamberlain referred to it, but the opposition bench was deserted and the Liberals could not be trapped into any discussion of the matter.

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U. S. Postoffice in China.

Washington, Aug. 3.—The postmaster general has issued an order establishing a military postal station in China on August 25, to be known as Military Postal Station No. 1, China, with facilities for the transaction of money order and registry business, the sale of postal supplies and the dispatch of the mail.

Severe Gale in England.

London, Aug. 4. 4:20 a. m.—A severe gale is raging throughout the United Kingdom. Channel traffic is suspended, causing much inconvenience to thousands of excursionists who wished to take advantage of the August bank holiday. Rain and wind have done much damage in the provinces. Several small vessels have gone ashore and many others have been obliged to seek refuge in the harbors.

Washington, Aug. 3.—Gen. Wood at Havana has reported the following deaths from July 20th to 30th: Santiago, July 28th, Private Harry Schaefer, company A, Fifth Infantry, Columbia Barracks, July 25th, Private John Scranta, company A, Second Infantry.

Pinar del Rio, July 21st, Commissary Sergeant Francis Deanebord, First Infantry, Private Edward Welsh, company H, First Infantry, and Corp. William Fisher, company G, First Infantry. Matanzas, July 25th, Private John Stoner, company F, Second Cavalry, and Corp. Joseph Schaefer, who died of typhoid.
