



A great deal of comment was aroused not long ago by a paper read by Dr. Robertson of Livermore before the State Medical association, in which this physician accused the job women of neglecting their little ones. In fact he related advanced intellectual women of that man-given "sphere of womanhood" seemed content in physical rather than spiritual ministrations, while the wholehearted devotion of the man and woman led a western advertiser to make investigations on its own account. The statistics from which his deductions are drawn are accurate, in some areas necessitating a house-to-house survey. Scientific persons who may wish to use them may depend on their ultra accuracy.

The leading women's clubs of San Francisco are the California, with a membership of 527, Century, 221, Sun, 197, Corona, 150, Sorosis, 138, Woman's Press, 125, Philadelphia 121, and Laurel Hill, 102. The total aggregate membership is 1,617, of which 1,273 are married, and statistics of 89 of these are selected entirely at random and the statistics show that in the California club 78.3 per cent of the members are married, 23.2 per cent being single, 54 of the married members 24.3 per cent are childless and the proportion of children to each married member is 1.12 or each wife the greater number of these children are grown and the average of children under 15 is but 0.1 per cent, less than a quarter of 1 per cent per member.

For the Century club, with 527 members, 318 are married, 60.3 per cent are childless. The proportion of children to each member is 1.71 per cent and the proportion of children under 15 is 0.17 per cent. Of the 197 members of the Corona club, 137 are married, 69.5 per cent are childless and the proportion of children to each married member is 1.56 per cent. The proportion of children under 15 to each married member is .25 per cent. In the Sorosis club, out of 150 members, there are 97 married, 64.7 per cent are childless, and the proportion of children to each married member is 1.49 per cent, and the proportion of children under 15 to each member is .25 per cent.

In the Sorosis club 91.3 per cent of the 153 members are married, 73 per cent of these have children, and the proportion is 1.71 per cent children for each married member and 0.14 per cent of children under 15. Eighty and eight-tenths per cent of the 125 members of the California Woman's Press association are married and 63.2 per cent of these have children. The proportion of children to each married member is 1.54 per cent, and the percentage of young children, 15 per cent. The Philadelphia club has 124 members, 86.2 per cent of them married and 71.21 per cent of these mothers. The proportion of children to each married member is 2.19 per cent and the proportion of children 25 per cent. In Laurel Hill 96.6 per cent of the 311 members are married and have children. The proportion of children per married member is 1.14 per cent and the proportion of young
