He had samples and a measuring system, and was very personal in his letters, writing inviting residents to call and be measured. Prices ranged from \$25 for a pair of trousers to \$25 for a suit of the suits supposed to be just as good as those made by a home tailor.

Customers were the number of at least half a hundred were secured and the suits always required. A week ago last Sunday the young man with whom the note on his desk stating he had gone back to the road and would not be back for a week.

As days slipped by and the suits who had made deposits became impatient. An investigation was commenced. Neither Dunn's nor Bradford's commercial names were mentioned.

IDAHO. Weekly Weather and Crop Bulletin. Boise, Idaho, April 30.—United States department of agriculture climate and crop bulletin of the Idaho section, for week ending April 29, 1901.

The past week continued with favorable weather conditions prevailing; high temperature, with more than the average amount of sunshine was the dominant condition until the night of the 25th, when showers in valley sections and snow at elevated places occurred throughout the southern and central parts of the state.

On the morning of the 26th freezing temperatures occurred in nearly all parts of the state. Light to heavy showers were reported as having occurred in the northern and extreme western counties on the 26th and 27th, too late for publication in the bulletin of this date.
