The shell exploded, killing the general on the spot and mortally wounding his daughter, and severely injuring his wife and two other persons.

Another Anti-Mormon Statement to Be Taken—Suspicious Characters in Canyon East of Brigham City.

Brigham City, May 28.—The bright ray of hope that for forty-eight hours or more hung over the home of Deputy Sheriff Frank Thompson, and which gave promise that he would recover, has been greatly dimmed.
