Mercer at 9 o'clock this morning, drew a revolver and calmly commenced shooting at Edna Mercer, aged 12. He fired three shots, taking deliberate aim, but none took effect. He fled, but was pursued and captured. He pleaded guilty to a charge of assault with intent to do great bodily injury and was bound over to the grand jury. The Mercer's were strangers to him and no motive for his attack is known. He is believed to be insane, though seemingly rational.

A few days ago the Associated Press sent out an extract from an article published in the San Francisco Chronicle to the effect that there was a big powder combine contemplated.
