Two Salt Lake people, E. A. Vaughan, aged 42, and Mrs. Sarah Carter, 34, were yesterday at Ogden granted a license to wed. They were married there.

Several members of the City Council have requested Mayor Thompson to call a special meeting of that body and consequently the Council will convene tonight to consider some business which was left unfinished at Tuesday's early-adjourned session.

Bookkeepers of Salt Lake are taking steps to organize for mutual protection. Having this end in view a call has been issued which is signed by A. Wallace, J. E. McKee, Ida E. Rogers, H. S. Stone, Arthur Brown, T. S. Luff, Carl Dunsmuir, A. H. Keller.

T. C. Stebbins died in Denver on Wednesday evening. Deceased was at one time manager of the Mammoth mine here and was one of the locators of the Col. Sellers mine at Leadville. His wife, who survives him, was a sister of Dr. Maclean of this city.

Two men from the waterworks department are cutting off the water at the places where the rates have become delinquent. This measure is taken in order to allow the department and Treasurer Morris to make an early report and close accounts for the fiscal year.

About 8 o'clock last evening someone dropped a lighted match on the floor in one of the rooms of the Ford hotel. The blaze caused a good deal of excitement and an alarm of fire was turned in, station No. 1 responding. The fire was extinguished with the couple gallons of water. The damage done amounted to about \$100.

James O'Connell, the assistant superintendent of the registry department, with headquarters at San Francisco, has been in the city several days looking into the condition of his department in the local postoffice. He expressed himself as very well pleased with its management and then said that one thing that surprised him was the excellent lack of interest in this city respecting the new regulation which permits people to register letters and packages at their homes by simply turning them over to the mail carrier with the proper amount of postage. The carrier will give a receipt which is just as binding as the one given at the postoffice. Mr. O'Connell left today for San Francisco.

SAN JOSE SCALE COMES TO TOWN

Infected California Apricots Shipped Into the City.

FRUIT ORDERED DESTROYED

Dealers Prohibited From Selling Any More of the Pest-Spotted Californians.

Some contention has been distributed among local fruit growers by the discovery of a lot of apricots, infected with San Jose scale, which have been shipped into Salt Lake. The fruit was exposed for sale on market row and some of it had gone out among the public before the attention of John Boyce, county fruit inspector, had been called to the circumstance. Immediately he ordered the vendors and merchants to cease the sale of the infected fruit and to destroy all such which might be in their possession. It requires but slight contact with Utah orchards to spread the disease among the fruit here, and the utmost care is being taken to prevent its further spread. The infection is of a contagious nature. Once the infection takes hold the only means of routing it is by destruction of the orchards.

SHEPHERD IN TROUBLE.

A letter has been received by Ex-Senator Arthur Brown from Jesse M. Smith at Soda Springs, stating that the sheriff of Oneida county, accompanied by a deputy and an inspector, is at Soda Springs with warrants for the arrest of forty Utah shepherds who have sheep in Idaho. Among these are J. R. Olsen, the Ayolet Brothers, the three Nelsons, the Aliens and others who secured the injunction from Judge Healy restraining Idaho authorities from molesting Utah sheep. Mr. Smith says this action of the Idaho officers is in contempt of the orders made by Judge Healy and that it should be punished. Hearty support is given to the shepherds, and will go to Idaho when the hearing comes up to assist the Utah shepherds.

THE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION.

Private Banking Houses Petition for a Reduction of Thirty Per Cent in Their Valuation.

The private banking firms of W. S. McCornick & Co. and T. R. Jones & Co. yesterday afternoon petitioned the county board of equalization to reduce their assessments of bank capital 30 per cent.

The argument was advanced that this reduction is made on the assessments of national banks computed on the same basis. Assessor Eldredge's argument is that the exact amount of individual profits of national banks is known, but with private and state banks the only way of getting at the profits is by taking their sworn statements. Last year all such banks were allowed a reduction of 20 per cent from their sworn statements. McCornick & Co. are this year assessed at \$255,000 and T. R. Jones & Co. at \$175,000, and all the banks are assessed at from 15 to 20 per cent higher than they were a year ago. The board of equalization will pass on the matter tomorrow.

In the above table the assessments of the Zion's Savings bank and the Deseret Savings bank are omitted, practically all of their capital being represented in real estate which is taxed under that head.

Some property owners in the southwestern part of the city want a 20 per cent abatement of their assessments, as the proposed increase in valuation on account of the projected gas department has never been made.

In comparing the assessments the board finds that the valuations on the east side are lower than those on the west, and it is probable that the same increase in east side valuations will be made. The board will meet again Saturday morning at 10.
