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

After issuing the official call for next Saturday night President Shaffer said: "At noon today I called out all the men employed in the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Shipbuilding."

"After sending this telegram to Newcastle I received a reply which reads as follows: 'Mill will close. Men are all firm.'"

"The closing of all these mills will be felt by all classes. It will stop production and this will stop commerce. The effect will be bad and no one realizes it more than I do."

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CHINAMEN ARE AGAIN RISING

Tung Fuh Siang Has Started a New Rebellion.

WANTS TO DESTROY ALIENS

Government Braves Have Gathered and Will Use Their Guns and Tom-Toms to Stop Him.

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 6.—The steamer Queen Adelaide brings news that the Tien Chuan Liu rising is growing. A report has reached the French force in Peking from Cheng Ting Fu to the effect that a large number of defeated soldiers of Tung Fuh Siang, being combined with Lian Chwang Hui, have unfurled, in the government premises of Shen Chow, many banners with the motto: "Sweep China and destroy the aliens" on them.

On the receipt of a report that Tung Fuh Siang has started a rebellion and is marching upon Sian, says a Shanghai paper, the Chinese court has enlisted guards being inadequate to meet this.

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


New York, Aug. 7.—King Edward has been the recipient of a number of sympathetic messages from all parts of the world, says the London representative of the Tribune.

MRS. MEXIA IS AFTER RIGHTS.

Widow and Daughter of General Mexia in Contest of Will.

CASE A CELEBRATED ONE

Terms of Compromise to be Considered—Attorney Now in New York For That Purpose.

New York, Aug. 7.—George H. Plovman, a lawyer of Dallas, Texas, is in the city for the purpose of consulting his clients, Mrs. Mary Gray Mexia, widow of Gen. Enrique A. Mexia of the City of Mexico, and her daughter, Miss Amatea Luce Mexia, who are among the contestants of the will of Gen. Mexia, who died in the City of Mexico in 1896. His estate consists of more than 50,000 acres of land in Texas, as well as bonds and other property.

Officers of a compromise have been made by some of the contestants and Mr. Plovman will discuss these terms with Mrs. Mary Gray Mexia and her daughter, says the Dallas press.

The contest of the will, which has been before the court of Dallas for more than five years, is one of the most celebrated law cases of Texas. The estate, originally valued at \$1,000,000, is now believed to be worth about \$200,000. Mrs. Mexia and her daughter are now living in Paterson, N. J., where they have resided for several years.

Gen. Mexia held high rank in the Mexican army, was a close friend of President Diaz, for a long time being one of his chief advisers and for many years was president of the Mexican National Lottery.

According to evidence introduced during the contest of the will in the Dallas court it was shown that in 1864 he met Miss Mary Gray, who was at the time living with her father at New Orleans, Gen. Mexia being on active duty with the Mexican army at Tampico at the time fixed for the wedding a marriage by proxy was arranged.

The validity of this marriage by proxy has been repeatedly attacked inasmuch as Gen. Mexia, in 1868 married Mrs. Ramsey, the widow of Col. A. C. Ramsey, before his death a United States army officer.

Three children were born to Mrs. Ramsey while she was Col. Ramsey's wife, Clarence M., Inez and Adele. The second wife having died on March 23, 1896, the general married Mrs. Martha W. Weightman of this city. When Gen. Mexia's will was offered for probate in Dallas it was found he had left all his estate to Inez and Adele Ramsey Mexia. The Ramsey Mexia sisters have now offered to compromise the case, it is said, and the question of according the terms of compromise offered is being considered by the other side.

It is possible that an agreement will be reached before the return of Mr. Plovman to Dallas next month, according to statements that he has made here.

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
