LOCAL BRIEFS.

Lieut. Webb will probably be chosen as preceptor in the High school military department. The Woodbury Genealogical Society of Utah will meet on Monday, October 7, at 5 o'clock p. m., at the residence of F. B. Woodbury, No. 8 Orchard square.

The public road in City Creek canyon has been reopened. It was closed during the placing of a new intake pipe for the Twentieth ward tank of the waterworks system.

A number of mustered-out members of the marine corps passed through the city yesterday on their way home from Cavite. There were also several discharged boys from the Seventeenth infantry in the city last evening en route to the East.

L. J. Jordan, of La Grande, Oregon, is stopping at the Walker house. He is in the city for the purpose of interesting home-seekers in his section of the country. He reports that he has sold \$12,000 worth of property within the last few days indicating that his country is attracting some attention.

John H. Eccles of Scofield has taken a contract for the erection of a new \$2,000 school house at Clear Creek. It will be 26x36 feet, constructed of frame and two stories high. On the lower floor there will be two large class rooms and a large hall on the upper floor. The building is to be completed by November 15.

The local Yale graduates are receiving letters from their class secretaries requesting attendance at the Yale bi-centennial celebration, beginning October 20 next. Attorney George J. Gibson, of this city, of the class of '95, expects to leave next week to attend. C. J. Brooks, of the class of '70, expects also to attend.

The troops at Fort Douglas were put through inspection today by the new officers. The post is undergoing its fall house cleaning and the officers quarters are being very much improved in various respects. The latest arrival is Captain Sturges and he and fellow officers seem to have made a good impression on the boys. Capt. Schley and Maj. Egan are in Ogden to see recruits for the new organization planned.

C. W. Benedict, of the Beatty Manufacturing company of St. Louis, is in the city, having come here to direct the finishing of the interior embellishments of Senator Kearns' mansion. Mr. Benedict says the work will be finished in about sixty days. He says further that the vestibule will be one of the finest west of New York City. It is to be composed of marble, massive iron, bronze and heavy plate glass doors, and lined with imported green marble.

It is understood that George H. Peabody, the New York philanthropist, is considering the proposition of assisting the local Y. M. C. A. in the erection of a handsome and suitable building. He has not yet decided whether to give \$10,000 or \$50,000 for the construction of an edifice with the provision that the association furnish a site, or to give \$25,000 with the understanding that the local organization will give \$15,000 which would insure a splendid building and a central location. The members of the association hope that he will proceed upon the former plan for they perceive the difficulty they would meet in trying to raise \$75,000.



MAJORS' LIFE IS SAVED BY JURY.

Last Night a Verdict of Murder in the Second Degree Was Brought In—Took Over Nine Hours to Arrive At a Conclusion.

(Special to the "News.")

Logan, Oct. 5.—The jury in the Majors case was conducted to a small room in the courthouse at 11 a. m. Friday and had not reached a verdict up to 7 o'clock last evening. They had not asked for anything to eat or drink up to that hour, and were still busy arguing the case, as evidenced by the buzz of voices emanating from the room.

All afternoon the jury struggled with the case, and at 8 p. m. announced that they were ready to report. Court, lawyers, defendant and officers were quickly summoned. Foreman Wright handed out the following verdict: "We, the jury, find Abraham R. Majors guilty of murder in the second degree, as charged."

All were asked if that was their verdict, and they replied in the affirmative. The court set Tuesday, Oct. 5, as the time for passing sentence.
