

LI HUNG CHANG DIED TODAY.

The Cause of Death Was Chronic Gastritis.

BURIAL CLOTHES PUT ON.

Chinese Officials Fear His Demise May Cause an Anti-Foreign Demonstration.

Pekin, Nov. 7.—Li Hung Chang died at 11 o'clock this morning. He had been ill for some time with ulceration of the stomach. When his physicians visited him yesterday morning they found him in good spirits, though extremely weak, as the result of sitting up and working in defiance of his instructions.

Throughout the night digitalis was frequently administered. Earl Li's persistent refusal to refrain from attending to government business aggravated his malady, while the refusal of the family to permit certain measures customary in western medical practice for relieving the stomach contributed to hasten his end.

The burial clothes have already been put on. The courtyard of the yamen is filled with life-size paper horses and chairs with coolie bearers, which his friends are sending, in accordance with Chinese customs, which will be buried in order to carry his soul to heaven.

Several of the ministers of the powers have called to express sympathy. The Chinese officials are somewhat uneasy concerning the effect his death will have on the populace, and to guard against a possible anti-foreign demonstration the Chinese generals have disposed their troops about the city in such a way as to command the situation. Trouble, however, is extremely improbable.

Chinese officials among the yamen. Telegrams have been sent summoning Prince Ching, who is now on his way to meet the court, and Chou Fou, provincial treasurer, from Pao Ting Fu. The former will assume the general charge of government affairs and the latter will act as governor of Chi Li until Li Hung Chang's successor in that office, who will probably be Num Shi Kai, is appointed.

Robert Colman, an American, who is one of the physicians attending Li, told the correspondents of the Associated Press that when he was called to act with Dr. Valde of the German legation November 1, he found the patient very weak from a severe hemorrhage due to ulceration of the stomach. "The hemorrhage was readily controlled," said Dr. Colman, "but owing to the underlying condition of chronic gastritis the patient was no longer able to get rid of the collection of mucus which he had freely expectorated."

AMERICA AND CHINA.

Ex-Commissioner Rockhill Favors Establishing a Bank.

Washington, Nov. 7.—W. W. Rockhill, who represented this government in the final settlement with China, has had a conference with Arthur Taylor, of the treasury department, in regard to the representation of the United States on the commission of the bankers, who will be the terms of the final protocol, is charged with the duty of receiving and paying over to the several governments in interest the sums to be paid by China as indemnity. Mr. Rockhill favors the establishment of an American bank in China.

New Dry Dock for Brooklyn.

New York, Nov. 7.—Plans are now being completed in the Brooklyn navy yard for proposed dry dock No. 4. The dock is to have a pumping plant situated in the bottom of the caisson and operated by electricity. No such pump has been used before in this country. The electrical power station is to be situated some distance from the dock. Pumping plants of this character are commonly used in Europe, and it is contended by officials at the yard that the government will be saved \$70,000 by its use.

Officers Need Not Attend Mass.

New York, Nov. 7.—A despatch from Paris to the London Times and the New York Times says that M. De Lathauze, minister of marine, has notified the officers of the navy that attendance at mass is no longer compulsory.

Australian Tariff.

New York, Nov. 7.—The Melbourne correspondent of the London Times and the New York Times says there is an increased possibility of hostile action against the governments tariff bill because of the seating of Mr. Mathieson as premier of Australia from trade member of parliament, in spite of a protest. The attempt to shove the labor party's bill excluding Kanaka labor by referring it to a special committee was not supported by the government and failed.

Jockey Hurt at Hurdles.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—At the horse show last night Peter Roche, a rider, was seriously injured. He attempted to force his horse over a 6 foot 3 inch hurdle. The attempt was unsuccessful, and the horse carried down falling upon and crushing his rider. The accident caused a semi panic and several women fainted.

CONDITION OF ITALIANS.

The Pope's Delegate Finds They Are Well Treated in America.

New York, Nov. 7.—Bishop Scalabrini who was delegated by the pope to prepare a report upon the condition of the Italian immigrants in this country has just completed his mission and will return to Rome next Tuesday. He expressed himself as being delighted with the reception and the care of the Italians in this country and said that his report would be favorable. He said that Archbishop Dimezio Falconio would succeed Cardinal Martinelli.

The bishop has visited many mission houses of the Italians during his visit here and has closely investigated the conditions of the poor Italians. He said:

"I have been here long enough to learn that the Italian is given a fair chance to make his living. I was particularly interested in the private care given the Italian immigrant, and I shall make a most satisfactory report to the pope on this subject.

CLARK A BILLIONAIRE.

Montana Senator Said to Be the Richest Man in the World.

The day of billionaires—and even multi-billionaires—appears to be at hand. And it is not the effete east that has them, either, but the roistering, boundless, inspiring west. The United Verde mine at Jerome is credited with having made its owner, Senator Clark, of Montana, the richest man in the world, so rich in fact that the combined wealth of the Rockefellers, the Vanderbilts, the Pierpont Morgans and the Carnegies represents a sum that he could lose and still be the richest man in the world.

It is estimated that the famous Verde represents a value in excess of five billions—when written in figures it would look like this \$5,000,000,000; and Senator Clark owns 50 per cent of this valuable mine, upon which he is called upon by Arizona officials to pay only \$24,000 annual taxes.—Matt and Bullion.

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CITY OF PANAMA FALLS.

It is Under the Complete Control of the Liberal Party.

Gen. Alban, the Governor, Believed To Be a Prisoner—Isthmus Will Be Kept Open.

New York, Nov. 7.—The Herald prints the following: From a source of information on the situation in Colombia which has thus far furnished no news not subsequently verified by wire, has been received the copy of a telegram saying that the city of Panama has fallen and is in the complete control of the liberal party. It is believed by the New York representative of the liberals that Gen. Alban, the governor of Panama department, is a prisoner, unless he has escaped by sea. To A. P. Echeveria, who is an active member of the revolutionary party in the United States, the cable message came at half past 9 o'clock last (Wednesday) evening.

LETTER FROM MISS STONE.

Messenger Sent by Russian Diplomatic Agent Returns With One.

New York, Nov. 7.—The messenger sent by M. Bakmeteff, the Russian diplomatic agent, to the brigands has returned bearing a letter from Miss Stone to a former pupil at Sofia, says the Sofia correspondent of the Journal and Advertiser. M. Bakmeteff, having thus established communication with the brigands, has turned the letter and details over to Mr. Dickinson, (American consul, saying the latter has the ransom and upon him rests the responsibility.

Kruger Talks on Arbitration.

New York, Nov. 7.—According to the London correspondent of the Tribune, a Johannesburg financial house had just had a remarkable chat with ex-President Kruger about South African prospects. The ex-president's talk was all of arbitration which he declared to be the only satisfactory way of ending the war. Asked what he would do if arbitration were offered the Boers, he replied that such a thing is impossible. It could not happen. "But assuming for the moment that it might," he added, "we should take up arms if arbitration went against us. We would never suffer the results of arbitration if those results were unjust or wrong."

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
