LA GRANDE, OREGON.

A recent letter from the sugar factory at this point conveys the following information: The factory here closed its season's run Nov. 9 after a total of 35,000 sacks of sugar, which approximates 3,500,000 pounds.

Eight hundred tons of lime rock have been consumed during the fifty days' run. Seventy-five tons of coke, many tons of sulphur and 500 gallons of lubricating oil were used. Over 4,000 cords of wood were burned by furnaces.


