CONTEST PLEASED CROWD.

Colorado Boy Proved to be a Whirlwind and Clearly Outfought His Clever Antagonist.

Before a crowd of over 1,500 loyal ring followers at the Salt Lake Athletic club last night, Willard Bean of Provo, went down to defeat against Flynn, a young fighter who hails from Colorado.

COMMERCIAL TEACHERS.

Meet and Organize an Association—Prof. Faris President.

A meeting of the commercial teachers of Utah was held Saturday at the Salt Lake Business college, at which the Utah Commercial Teachers' association was organized.

The following officers: President, Prof. Faris of the Agricultural college; first vice president, Prof. Hinkley of the L. D. S. university; second vice president, Prof. Nelson of the Salt Lake Business college; secretary, Prof. McKay of the Salt Lake High school, and treasurer, Prof. Beal of Snow academy of Ephraim, Utah.

A constitution and by-laws were adopted.

The object of the association is the general welfare of the commercial education in the state, as to the scope of the work demanded by the various institutions.

Sessions will be held semi-annually, on or about the first of April and the first of October.

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
