


PROMINENT OGDEN CITIZENS.



HON. JOHN A. BOYLE.

John A. Boyle is one of Ogden's stable citizens. He was born in Scotland fifty-five years ago, but came to Utah with his parents in 1855. Ever since arriving in the state, Ogden has been his home. In 1872 he and his father started a furniture business and he remained with it 20 years, long enough to see the firm become one of the largest of the kind in the state. He left the furniture business a few years ago, substituting for it that of hardware, in which he has been equally successful. For many years Mr. Boyle has been in close touch with the municipal affairs of Ogden. From 1882 to 1887 he served in the city council, and in 1897 was elected mayor. Although his administration only lasted one term he was recognized as a strong and honest executive. From 1891 to 1896 he held the office of city treasurer in which he was conspicuously efficient. He is now the vice president of the Ogden State bank, a position he has held for twelve years.
