HON. H. H. SPENCER.

H. H. Spencer is one of the most widely known men in Utah and the west. He was born in Hockingport, Athens county, Ohio, in 1852, and came to Utah in January, 1874. From that time up to the present he has made Ogden City his home. Mr. Spencer has figured prominently in the business progress of Ogden and has held a number of prominent positions. From 1891 to 1895 he was a member of the Ogden city council, over which body he presided during 1894 and 1895. In 1896 he was elected mayor of the city, which position he held with great honor for two years. He was a member of the Constitutional convention. Mr. Spencer is a director and member of the executive committee of the Ogden Sugar company, and was for 12 years manager of the Eccles Lumber company, at the present time being vice president of the company. He is vice president of the Ogden Rapid Transit Street Railway company; treasurer of the Ogden City Waterworks company; vice president of the Ogden Furniture and Carpet company; director and member of the executive committee of the Oregon Lumber company; general manager of the Ogden & Northwestern Railway company, running between Ogden and Hot Springs. Mr. Spencer has extensive business interests in Idaho and Oregon, and in the Sumpter Valley railroad.

CLUB CHAT

The visit of the New York delegation in the city on Tuesday was the principal club event of the week, and their reception and entertainment, to judge from the expression of the ladies, were as successful in a social way as could have been desired. The ladies were met at the depot by a committee with carriages which conveyed the guests to the Tabernacle, where a recital was given by Prof. McClellan, and afterward a meeting was arranged at the Church office, the National Council presidency. At 2:15 a special train went out to Salt Lake where the party spent a pleasant three hours, and later a delightful reception was given at the home of Mrs. Annie T. Hyde in honor of Mrs. Emilie Minor's beautiful luncheon.

The Ladies of the National Council of Women under the auspices of the Relief and Y. L. M. I. A., the affiliated societies of the council. Mrs. William Tod Helmuth, president of the Council, who was especially honored in the affair, was most enthusiastic in her remarks of the delightful entertainment accorded her and the rest of the party, declaring her visit here to be the pleasantest of the western trip. Mrs. Helmuth stated that it was her desire to have the meeting of the Council board take place in Salt Lake at an early date, and should lend her efforts to have the event take place here next year. Following is a sketch of the brilliant woman who stands at the head of the National Council.

Fannie Ida Helmuth was born in New York City and is of patriotic family, twenty-two members having fought in the Revolution on the American side. Her ancestors lived in New York from 1672, but during her early childhood her parents moved to St. Louis, where her father entered business as a banker, and was afterwards colonel, captain, and afterwards colonel of the first company of militia of the State of Missouri.

She took a keen interest in charitable work of all kinds from the time she was ten years old, and especially in the orphan's home of St. Louis, of which her mother was first directress.

Was the first woman to drive over the steel arch bridge constructed at St. Louis across the Mississippi river by the well known engineer, Capt James B. Eads, the captain being her escort. Was also the first woman to make the trip on the Missouri Pacific railroad to Indian Territory, and the first on the Ohio & Mississippi, after the opening of those roads and the retirement of stage coaches.

She was married to William Tod Helmuth in St. Louis, February 10, 1859, and has three children, two of whom are living.

Has always taken great interest and pride in her husband's advancement in his profession, and his welfare is always considered first. She and her husband moved to New York in 1874, and three hospitals in this city had their beginning in her house. On one occasion \$100,000 were raised in two weeks during the first year she was in New York by means of a fair for the benefit of one of these hospitals. For another a fair was given and \$10,000 were realized.

Mrs. Helmuth also founded, and for eleven years was president of the Women's Guild of the New York Homeopathic Medical college and hospital.
