BUSINESS ON EXCHANGE SMALL

SAN JUAN HAS BIG OIL FIELDS.

PRICES WERE IRREGULAR.

Mining Market Extremely Dull And Prices Shrink.

Flowing Wells of Rich Oil Reported Near Bluff City.

Grangers Sagg'd Then Stiffened Sharply.

CALIFORNIA THE FEATURE.

COMPANY SOON TO OPERATE.

DEMAND FOR ST. PAUL.

The Stock Traded Heavily Around 11 1/2 - Total Transactions Involved 61,201 Shares and \$9,093.

One Well Has Flow of 25 Barrels Daily of Heavy Paraffin Oil - Other Oil Notes.

Market Generally Was Inclined To Dulness There Being Few Exceptions Among Stocks.

Trading on the mining exchange was extremely dull this morning and almost without feature. Transactions involved less than \$10,000, notwithstanding that over 60,000 shares were dealt in.

A new oil field has been recently discovered in southwestern Utah. It is situated some 50 miles west of Dolores, Colorado, a station on the Denver & Rio Grande railroad and is near Bluff City in San Juan county.

New York, May 22.-Opening prices showed irregular changes from last night. The grangers sagged and then stiffened sharply. Reading fell a full point to 11 1/2. Amalgamated gained a point, Smeltin demand sprung up which carried St. Paul nearly two points over last night and a number of other railroads 1/2 to 1 point.

The feature of the morning was the trading in California, over 16,000 shares of which were called into action. There is much speculation as to whether the company will be able to reorganize upon a plan beneficial to stockholders and upon one that will enable the company to secure enough money to pay the present indebtedness and permit of some development work being done.

Bluff City will be well remembered by many of the old prospectors of Colorado and Utah, as the scene of a great gold excitement early in the 80's. The effect of this excitement was the discovery of the new oil fields. L. E. Goodridge, the discoverer of the oil, was one among the many who were attracted to the gold fields. He failed to discover any gold, but in passing over the country, he discovered unmistakable indications of oil.
