AFFAIRS OF WEBER COUNTY

Grand Pageant on Memorial Day—Composition of Parade.

Fiftieth Annual Commencement of Weber County Schools—Death of Mrs. A. A. Pederson.

At the meeting of the board of county commissioners held yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock Gen. Mgr. Nunn of the Utah Power company, also Messrs. Lachner and Woodhouse of the company were present. Mr. Nunn stated to the board that he was present to represent the company in making application for a franchise to run an electric car line through the canyon to the Cache Valley divide. Commissioner Sikes explained to the gentlemen the reason the former application was refused, was because of the violation of the provisions of the act in the matter of the company. Mr. Nunn stated that he would have a written application prepared to present to the board at its next meeting, so that the company as possible franchise surveys and if the route is found a feasible one that the line would be built, but if it found not feasible it would return the franchise.

The board it is understood, is favorable for the proposition if a suitable franchise can be agreed upon. James Storey and H. Barker appeared before the board on behalf of the latter asking for the removal of Jesse Vanderhorst as road supervisor of North Ogden, and made verbal statements of the charges against Mr. Vanderhorst.

Petition signed by John Jones and 78 others asking for the retention of Jesse Vanderhorst as road supervisor of North Ogden also a number of persons who signed the same, were received and filed and the matter was referred to Commissioner Sikes to investigate. Commissioner Stanford reported that he had employed Charles Welch to investigate aid from the county. As a result of which 11 parties receiving monthly allowance have been dropped from the list resulting in a saving of \$40 per month. The committee on poor will open up a record for the purpose of keeping account and record of all parties receiving assistance from the county.

Commissioner Stanford reported Mrs. England at county infirmary in poor health, and has become a burden to the matron at the institution. The matter was referred to Commissioner Sikes with full power to dispose of matter, and if it is found she has relatives able to care for her and it is thought advisable to remove her from the infirmary and have her relatives care for her.

The matter of preparing a map of Weber county, showing precincts, school districts, road districts and election district boundary lines, was referred to Commissioner Stanford and Carl Hollingsworth.

A petition was presented signed by R. Livingston and others asking for the appointment of Fred Wilson as county fish and game warden, was received and filed.

The application of S. V. Grow for re-appointment as county fish and game warden also a letter and petition from John Sharp, state fish and game commissioner, and others asking for the re-appointment of Grow, were received and filed.

England, county fruit tree inspector, filed his report showing the prospects for a bounteous crop of fruit to be excellent.

Joseph Switwick presented a petition of Warren Campbell and 32 others, praying for the laying of a new road in Liberty. The petition was read and the matter taken under advisement.

MEMORIAL DAY PAGEANT. Arrangements for Memorial day exercises have been completed and the minor details are now being prepared. The affair will be principally under the direction of the Grand Army of the Republic of the W. R. Corps.

There will be in line of march, Foster's military band, G. A. R. Veterans Relief Corps, Spanish War Veterans, and nearly all of the lodges in the city. The procession will be formed on Washington avenue near Twenty-fifth street at 9:30 a. m. Friday, May 30. The line of march will be north on Washington avenue to Twenty-fourth street, thence west to Grant avenue; thence south to Twenty-fifth street, west on Twenty-fifth street to depot, counter-march on Twenty-fifth street to Luter Park, north on Jefferson street to northwest corner of Lester Park, where a platform will be prepared for those who are to take part on the program.

A monument will be placed just in front of the platform, and that will represent all of the graves of the dead war heroes. This will be decorated during the services by wreaths of the girls dressed in white. Judge H. H. Rolapp, Rev. Father Cushman and addresses, singing will be furnished by the Baptist church and Mrs. Will Howell, J. V. Nelson will read the program. The procession will commence to march at 10 a. m.

EVIDENCE OF FOUL PLAY. Suspicious Circumstances Surround the Death of Young Roy Hansen.

Class Advancements in B. Y. A.—Training School Exhibition—Utah County Affairs.

Special Correspondence. Provo, Utah Co., May 27.—Sheriff Storrs returned from Springville last evening after viewing the remains of Roy Hansen, the young man who died near Rawlins, Wyoming, on the 22nd, and who was reported to have left a note saying that he had killed himself because he was tired of life. Sheriff Storrs and the relatives of young Hansen do not believe he committed suicide. The wound shows that the bullet entered below the heart and passed out below the right shoulder blade, a course it would be most unlikely to take if self-inflicted. He was only nineteen years of age, a boy of good habits and disposition, and was not known to have any trouble. He left Grand and Boyer's grading camp in New Mexico on the 25th of April; when he had about \$150 with him and was coming home, but made the mistake of leaving his way to save money. On the 2nd of May a companion left him in Denver, and Hansen intended to go from there to Nevada to work on the railroad. That is the last heard from him till the night of his death. A telegram came to Springville from Undertaker Rasmussen of Rawlins announcing his death. Sheriff Storrs has communicated with the sheriff of Carbon county, Wyoming, for particulars, and will institute an investigation in the case if the circumstances justify. He believes the note referred to in newspaper reports was written by the cashier who was interested in suppressing an investigation. None of the effects, if any were found on his body, have been forwarded to Springville. The certificate of death issued by the cashier states that the death resulted from a gunshot wound.
