NEW UNIFORM FOR THE ARMY.

President Approves Report of the Uniform Board.

DESIGNATE RANK ON SLEEVE

Overcoat in Double Breasted Ulster Of Olive Drab Woolen Material—Trousers With Gold Lace.

Washington, July 17.—While Secy. Root was at Oyster Bay the president considered and approved the report of the army uniform board.

The full dress coat is about the same as at present, save that the buttons are more spreading, with ornamental designs on the sleeve and with the rank designated on the sleeve instead of the shoulder knot.

A new dress uniform is provided, consisting of a sack coat of woolen or cotton material of an olive drab color with trousers to match.

A new full dress cap is provided, differing considerably from the present one in design and trimmings.

Big Freight Steamer Ordered. Cleveland, O., July 17.—C. W. Elpleck of Chicago has ordered a freight steamer from the American Ship Building company with a capacity of 5,200 tons and to cost \$250,000.

Will Sue for Being Borcotted. Fort Scott, Kansas, July 17.—Charles A. Sturms, a plumber who is unable to get into the Master Plumbers association of Kansas, or to buy goods from the city of Fort Scott, has filed suit here to prosecute a prosecution of its officers under the anti-trust law.

St. John Lateran Deteriorating. London, July 17.—According to the Rome correspondent of the Daily Express, the rich wooden ceiling of the church of St. John Lateran is cracked in several parts and a papal commission has reported that repairs costing \$4,000 are necessary to prevent its falling.
