TOSSED BY THE WIND AND WAVES

Eleven Excursionists Were in Danger.

CAUGHT IN SUDDEN SQUALL

Well Known Salt Lake Young People Remain Out on the Lake for Several Hours in Great Peril.

A party of 11 excursionists had a chance to learn the treachery of sudden storms on the lake late Saturday afternoon, and while they were in great danger for a time, beyond a few averted nerves, everybody is all right now.

The party started out on the catamaran, Clamshell II, in charge of Capt. Davis, at about 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon. They intended to cruise around Antelope island throughout the afternoon and to return to Salt Lake in the evening.

The trouble began when they headed for the shore at about 5:30 in the evening. They had not been out on the water very long when a sudden squall came upon them, which those who were out to Salt Lake testify was one of the fiercest that ever swept over the lake.

The wind blew in a hurricane, and the sea waves, very high, were dashed over the deck in moments.

Seeing that to remain with the sailing vessel meant death by drowning, Capt. Davis commanded the boats to be lowered and the excursionists given a chance to get ashore.

Finally the wind quieted down a little and Sidney Saville and Walter Conrad started for the shore to bring aid to those in danger. It took two hours of hard work, but they finally reached the pier about 10 o'clock, and took the 9:30 train to the city to inform the friends of the young people of their peril.
