Provo, Utah Co., Aug. 23.—Judge Milner, one of the Utah lake commissioners, in referring to the editorial in last evening's "News" under the head of "Practical Suggestions," said that under the instructions given the commissioner from the parties interested, they could not even consider any proposition that looks to the increase of the flow of water in the Provo river by diverting any other natural stream into it.
