

### INTEREST IN FAIR RACE MEET

Program Is a Good One and Will Doubtless Draw Large Crowds.

### FAST HORSES ARE ENTERED

Horsemen Generally and Lovers of The Sport Are Enthusiastic Over The Outlook—Begins Tuesday.

What is generally conceded will be the best race meet given in this city for many years begins next Tuesday at Agricultural park under the auspices of the D. A. & M. society and will continue for three days. Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday will be big days for the horsemen and they are all enthusiastic over the present outlook. The purses which are hung up for the various interesting events are all worth striving for and that is the reason all the best horses in the city, and some from other cities are entered. Tuesday will probably see the largest crowd in attendance in the event that the stores are closed, and the grand stand will be taxed to its capacity.

Those who expected a walk away in the free-for-all will doubtless be disappointed in the line up of starters. One animal in particular which is expected to set a hard pace for the others in this event is Hobo, owned by Wells & Stone. The horse has been on the northwestern circuit for several weeks past and has made a very fine showing.

Then there is Altoka, Hal Brown's speedy animal, Vesta C, Julia A, Monroe 3 and Sarah Green, all good horses, and all can be depended upon to make the race a lively one.

That Mrs. William Rockefeller is a believer in clean Sunday sports is evidenced by her conflict with the local authorities when they sought to stop a game on her grounds between two local teams. Near her husband's summer home there is a big vacant lot which local ball players are free to use at any time. Last Sunday a "blood" game was scheduled and two of the deacons of a local church called on Sheriff Fitch to stop the game. They went to the place, where they were ordered off by the superintendent on orders of Mrs. Rockefeller. The sheriff appealed to the lady, who defied him to arrest anybody on the estate on the ground that so long as the wealthy in the neighborhood were permitted to play golf on Sunday others could play baseball on her grounds.

#### FIRST FOOTBALL GAME.

Played This Afternoon at Ogden—Salt Lake vs Ogden.

The first football game of any consequence of the season now upon us, is scheduled for Ogden this afternoon between the Salt Lake High school team and the Ogden eleven. These teams have

been practicing some time for the event and both are confident of carrying off the honors of the day. The teams are well matched in almost every particular and the battle is sure to be fierce in every respect.

Up at the university the boys are hard at work and are getting lined up in proper shape rapidly. Judging from the present outlook this year's team will surpass any of the past from that institution. It is the hope and desire of those who have it in charge to put a team in the field which will carry everything before it so far as local teams are concerned.

The Y. M. C. A. is also coming to the front with a lively bunch of hot blue wrestlers and whatever team bumps up against them will know they have been up against something strenuous. While Manager Margetts is arranging dates, etc., Capt. Smith is drilling the boys and putting them into top shape for gridiron work.

#### CARTER GOT ENOUGH.

He Says He Wants No More Fights With Tommy Ryan.

Ryan found Carter a sturdy opponent. Strong as a young bull, game as a fighting cock and terribly aggressive, Carter showed terrific hitting power and on the whole was a dangerous opponent for any of the high class middleweights or light heavyweights to encounter.

Ryan, while the recipient of many blows, was up bright and early next morning and looked as though he had been the star performer at a ping-pong party, rather than the victim of a championship battle. Carter, on the other hand, looked like he had been fighting a threshing machine. Both of his eyes were closed and his lips and nose were battered out of shape. When asked his opinion of the fight, he said:

"Just say for me I don't want any more fights. That little fellow can lick Jeffries. When he began mixing with me I thought I had him, but he can take some punching himself. I don't want any more of his game. He can whip all of the middleweights easily, and I would advise a few of the heavyweights to keep out of his way, unless they want the short end of the purse."

Ryan will leave here this morning for his home in Kansas City. Discussing future plans this morning he said: "I will fight any man in the world at 155 pounds, and at that I will be giving away plenty of weight." Tommy weighed only 147 pounds yesterday, while Carter barely made the weight—155 pounds.

Jack Dugan, whose betting made the eastern sports open their eyes, said this morning that he would bet \$10,000 that Ryan could beat any man in the world who weighed in at the middleweight limit. "Ryan draws the color line," said Dugan, "and I don't blame him, but still if he wants to fight Walcott I will bet 10 to 7 for all they can bring me."

#### CORBETT'S HARD LUCK.

Denver Champion Finds Himself Completely Strapped—Bids for Fight.

A recent dispatch from Cincinnati says:

"Young Corbett" and Manager Sam Harris held a conference over the telephone this afternoon and agreed that bids for a 20-round fight between McGovern and Corbett would be received from any reputable club in New York, the contest to take place early in December or at such other date as might be satisfactory to club and fighters.

Corbett finds himself flat, financially speaking, and he is very sore. "It's tough luck," he said, "but we have got to make the best of it. I will get in the ring with Terry some time sooner or later. I have nothing, but I guess I will be able to make a living even if they don't let me fight any more."

Sam Harris offered to give Corbett a benefit at which Terry and his brother are willing to appear. It is the plan to have Terry's brother box with Corbett. Arrangements for this have not yet been completed, but it may take place in this city.

McGovern goes with a variety show to Louisville next week. Corbett has made no plans as yet.

#### BASEBALL AFFAIRS.

Pacific Northwest League is Apparently Making Money.

During the week M. E. Mulvey returned from a trip to the northwest and upon his return spoke in glowing terms of the baseball situation in the Pacific Northwest league. Mr. Mulvey attended some of the games and said he never saw better ones in his life. Last Sunday he attended the game at Seattle where there were 10,000 enthusiastic, yelling rooting fans present. "This would indicate that the league is in a most healthful condition, that money is being made, and that it would be a good thing for Salt Lake and Ogden to secure berths in the league if possible. Now that Ogden has come forward with the statement that they will co-operate with Salt Lake in the matter, the prospects for the league taking in he two cities is very bright. Mr. Mulvey is of the opinion that if the Utah towns can make the combination with the league it will give Salt Lake the best baseball sport it has had since the very early days of the game in Utah.

### BILLY KING TO ENTER LONG RACE

Expected to Compete in Six Day Grind This Winter.

### MADISON SQUARE GARDEN.

Walthour, Maya, Newkirk, Jacobson and Others Will Ride—News of The Circuit Chasers.

Most of the racing cyclists are arranging with partners for the six day team race that will be held in Madison Square Garden early in November. This contest is one that requires speed as well as endurance, for the race is rarely won by more than a few feet. Last year five teams were tied until the last mile and a sprint determined the distribution of the prize money.

Walthour, finished first and as his partner Archie McEachern is dead, he will have to secure another mate for the big event. Lester Wilson, of the Rambler team, will again ride with Otto Maya as his partner, while Ed Newkirk, of the Crescent team, and J. P. Jacobson, of the Cleveland team, are expected to combine their speed and experience in an effort to win the first prize. W. F. King, of the Tribune team, who was dubbed the "Hobo," will again be a competitor and it is not unlikely that George C. Schriber, the New York speed merchant, may elect to be among the starters.

It is also possible that Johnnie Chapman will take a chance in accordance with Lawson's suggestion. Chapman has not yet fully decided.

#### WALTHOUR AFTER RECORDS.

Having won the middle distance championship of America "Bobbie" Walthour of Atlanta, Ga., will now attempt to put the world's hour record higher than it has ever been placed by a bicycle rider. Following the news from a broad that Jimmy Michael had negotiated more than 46 miles in the hour, Walthour announces that he will attack the record within another week.

With his speed, called "Candy," the rider is confident of his ability to travel 47 miles on the Pittsburgh track within 60 minutes. The board oval in the "Smoky City" is one of the fastest in the country and having accidents the blonde Southerner may be expected to supply this railroad speed.

Apart from holding most of the world's records up to 25 miles Walthour has had some remarkable riding in competition, defeating every rider of note. Last week he scored over Albert Champion, for the second time, in a race that settled any championship question beyond argument. During the season he has had a successful trip, twice, and Bob Armstrong. That Madden does not intend to let the grass grow under his feet while here is evident. He will "get busy," he says, at once and look up matches for his respective men scheduled for matches.

#### WILL BUILD COLISEUM.

Encouraged by the success of other promoters, business men in various cities throughout the country are preparing to invest in cycle coliseums. Particularly in this so in the South, since "Bobbie" Walthour of Atlanta won the middle distance championship of America. Messrs. Pickens and Bell are constructing an eight lap track at East Lake near Birmingham, Ala., and will open late in September. James Burbridge of Jacksonville is negotiating with E. M. Sperry for the construction of a board track at Jacksonville which is expected to open about the middle of October. Savannah and Atlanta are excellent cycling towns and the four cities are expected to furnish enough racing during the winter to keep the riders busy.

#### HALL MAY GO TO FRANCE.

Tommy Hall, the English rider, has decided to return to France for a few months but will visit America again in time for the six day race. The diminutive member of the Monarch racing team made a decided hit in the long contest at Madison Square Garden last year and was taken under the wing of J. C. Kennedy, who supplied him with motor tandems for middle distance racing during the summer. Considering it was his first season behind pace the youngster did first rate and next year should see him amongst the top-notchers. He expects to do more or less racing on the French tracks during September and October and will return to New York early in November to prepare for the six day team race at Madison Square Garden.

#### MUNRO'S GOOD TIME.

In their recent 20 mile single paced race at Philadelphia, Ben Munro averaged 1.29 to the mile and scored a number of individual trials in 1:24-2:5. Followers of racing will be glad to learn that Munro will recover from the deplorable accident at Baltimore when an accident to one of the pacing machines caused Munro to be thrown against a wooden pillar. The Memphis lad sustained a fractured skull and little hope was entertained for his recovery during the first two days he was in the hospital. Reports from Baltimore state that he is improving, but he will probably be unable to race for a year. His

partner on the Cleveland team, Jimmy Hunter, will lose the sight of one eye as a result of the accident, while George Leander, who was another contestant in the race, will be in the hospital for a few weeks with a broken ankle.

#### KRAMER AGAIN CHAMPION.

The grand circuit of the National Circuit association ended on Sept. 13, and Frank Kramer is again the champion. "Major" Taylor was second and Iver Lawson, whose bad fall kept him off the track for three weeks, secured third place honors. The Salt Lake rider expected to evolve a champion this year and although he offers no excuse for defeat he hopes for a little better luck in 1903. Owen Kimble, of the Tribune team, although racing for the past seven years, made a better showing this season than ever before and should be a formidable opponent for the sprinters in 1903.

Cycle racing will be transferred within a few weeks from the North to the South. The speed merchants will go to Atlanta, where Jack Prince has erected a Coliseum on which the fastest kind of racing can be conducted. "Bobbie" Walthour, the middle distance champion of the year; George Leander of the Crescent team, and James Hunter of the Cleveland team, are among the riders who are scheduled for matches. It is not unlikely that some of the sprinters will also decide to take an inning in the South.

#### MADDEN AND HIS MEN.

Billy, Gus Rublin and Denver Ed Martin Have Returned.

Billy Madden and his pair of big scrappers, Gus Rublin and Denver Ed Martin, have returned from Europe. Madden's men have had a successful trip. Under Madden's watchful eye Rublin defeated Tom Sharkey before the National Sporting club in June, while Martin trimmed Sandy Ferguson, Frank Craig, the "Harlem Coffee Cooler," twice, and Bob Armstrong. That Madden does not intend to let the grass grow under his feet while here is evident. He will "get busy," he says, at once and look up matches for his respective men scheduled for matches.

"Of course, the first thing we intend to do," said Madden, "is to go after

Jim Jeffries. He is the man we want, because he is champion. Admitting that he has already defeated Rublin, that is no proof that he can do the trick again. If you could have seen Rublin fight Tom Sharkey you would not have dreamed that he was the same man who was whipped by the Bolshemaker last year. He is a better man now, in my opinion, than he has been for years. Should Jeffries ignore Gus I will direct my attention toward Bob Fitzsimmons. We will agree to any reasonable date and place suitable to Fitz. Should both Fitzsimmons and Jeffries place a ban on Rublin I will offer them a match with my colored champion, Denver Ed Martin.

"There are no flies on Martin, even if I say so myself. He is the cleverest regro pugilist in the world, not even overlooking the late Peter Jackson. Since I took hold of Martin he has developed into a wonder. He knows how to punch, is game and is up to date. Martin is champion of England and Puhlin is champion of Ireland."

#### Gaylord's Horses for Sale.

Several horses of Edwin Gaylord's harness string are to be put up for sale in New York this winter. Charley Mac, probably the best of the lot, with Lee Crawford and Frank Dale will also go, and probably Confiance and the Steinway pacer, Darkway. Mr. Gaylord will not retire from the racing business, but will in the future confine his attention to developing young horses instead of campaigning them. In discussing the matter, Mr. Gaylord said: "I don't know just how many horses I shall sell until I go east and see how they are all going. I am not going to retire from the racing business. I will devote my attention in the future principally to developing and racing young horses, and shall keep Ladysmith, one of my recent acquisitions, and of course will keep Agnes Lee May in Denver as a road mare. Charley Mac is a good horse and is all I expected he would be. He is racing well, but has been out-classed this year on the grand circuit thus far. That is why I am going to sell him. I won't sell any of the horses unless I can get a good price for them."
